Randolph has a New Environmental Guidebook

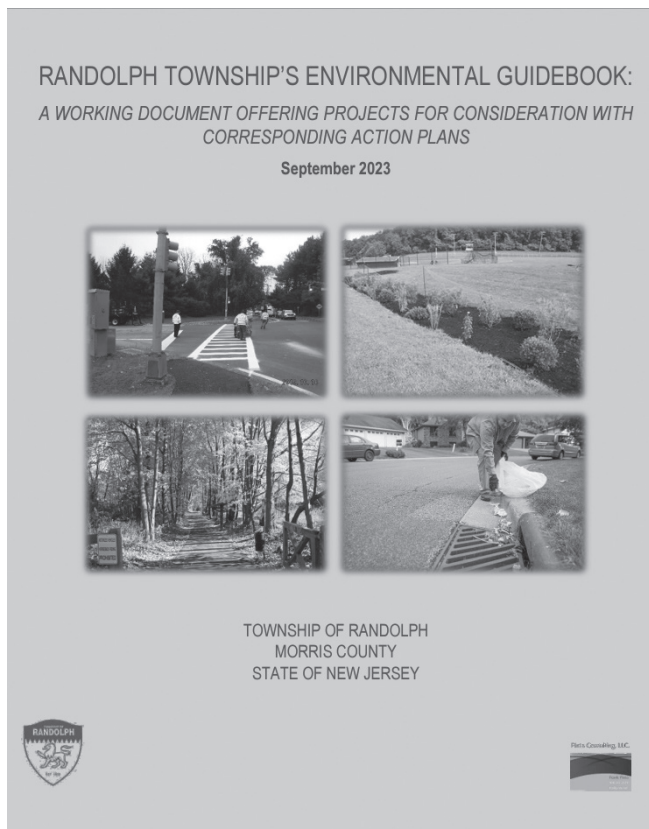
The Randolph Township Environmental Guidebook (RTEG) is a living document, subject to annual review, that contains information about contributors to climate change and environmental degradation, and details projects and strategies that can be implemented locally to create positive and measurable change.

Designed to be utilized at different scales, from municipal leadership to volunteer groups, the RTEG is overseen by the Environmental and Landmark Committee and was developed in consultation with Pinto Consulting, LLC. The comprehensive resource contains detailed recommendations for 49 projects across 11 action categories: Air Quality, Climate, Community Engagement, Energy, Food, Housing and Economic Development, Natural Resources Management, Open Space, Transportation, Waste Management, Water.

The Environmental and Landmark Committee and the Township of Randolph are proud to share the RTEG with the community as collaboration between residents and the municipal government is essential for reaching shared goals of sustainability, environmental stewardship, and resiliency. In working together towards these shared goals, the outcomes earned will benefit the entire community in its overall health, wellness, and pride.

An outside entity or volunteer group interested in implementing a Guidebook project should present their plan for completing the project to the Environmental and Landmarks Committee. Details to be included are the location of the project, the anticipated number of volunteers working on the project, the anticipated time frame, the estimated costs, any assistance needed from township staff, and the benefits to the environment and/or community.

As the year comes to a close, please be sure that your tax and water and sewer charges are paid up-to-date. All open 2023 and prior year balance(s) will be subject to further action including but not limited to, tax sale and water shut off. If your open charges are subject to tax sale, a lien will be placed on your property. For information regarding your payoff amount or if you have questions, please contact the tax department at 973-989-7047 OR the water and sewer department at 973-989-7063.

ONLINE PAYMENTS FOR PROPERTY TAX AND WATER AND SEWER CHARGES

You may pay your property taxes and your water and sewer charges online at www.randolphnj.org using your checking account. Please note that there are no fees charged to use this method of payment. This service is FREE. If you have any questions, please call 973-989-7047 or 973-989-7063.

ANCHOR PROGRAM

The Affordable New Jersey Communities for Homeowners and Renters (ANCHOR) Property Tax Relief Program current filing is for 2020. This program provides property tax relief to NJ residents who owned or rented their principal residence (main home) on October 1, 2020, and meet certain income limits.

If you have not received your refund or confirmation letter, you have until Friday, December 29, 2023, to file the 2020 ANCHOR application.

Christmas Tree Collection

The Randolph Township Public Works Department will be picking up residents' Christmas trees this holiday season. The trees must be bare, with no stands, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. Christmas trees must be put out at the curb no later than January 8th.

Trees put out later than this date WILL NOT be picked up by the township. However, Christmas trees will be accepted at the Recycling Center anytime during normal working hours.



Protect Your Water Meter and Pipes for Winter

You are probably aware that your water pipes could freeze during the winter months, but did you know that your water meter could also freeze if not properly protected? A frozen water meter would not only be an inconvenience, but an unexpected expense. A technician would be sent from the township to replace the frozen water meter; however, the customer would be responsible for the cost of replacement. Steps you can take to protect your pipes and water meter include:

- Ensure that the water meter is located in a heated area such as a basement crawl space, out of the wind and weather.
- If your water lines or meter are not in a properly heated area, or are in an area prone to freezing, wrap them with insulation and/or heat tape.
- In extreme cold, or if your pipes have frozen in the past, allow one of your faucets to run slowly. This is most effective with faucets that are farthest from the point where the main line enters the house, or on outside walls. A slight increase in your water bill may be better than the costly task of replacing a frozen meter, water pipes, or damaged property.

Flu Vaccines Available by Appointment

Get your family vaccinated against flu this season. The Randolph Township Health Department carries flu vaccines for children (6 months and up), adults, and seniors. To schedule a flu vaccine, please call the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118. Home visits are available for homebound residents. The vaccine is free for uninsured, underinsured, NJ Family Care, and Medicare Part B or available for \$20 cash or check for those with private insurance.

Guidelines for Winter Weather Events

Randolph Township encourages all residents to follow these guidelines during the winter months so that the Public Works Department can maintain your roads to the best of their ability.

- **Basketball Posts:** Prior to snow events, remove all basketball posts that are located within the road or the road right of way. These posts and backboards can produce damage to the Public Works Department’s equipment while performing snow related duties.
- **Vehicle Parking:** When there is snow, vehicles are not permitted to be parked on the streets of Randolph Township. This is a Township Ordinance and is subject to fine. To avoid snow from hitting your vehicle when the plows pass, please do not park your vehicle close to the roadway..
- **Snow into the Roadway:** Do not deposit snow into the roadway either by plowing, snow blowing, or shoveling. Whether you or your contractor deposits the snow into the road, it is against the Township Ordinance. This creates a hazard for our plowing operators. All snow should be plowed, blown, or shoveled onto your property.
- **Garbage Cans:** Do not place your cans in the road for garbage pickup. The drivers cannot take the time to stop plowing and move the garbage cans out of the way. Cans should be placed behind the curb and far enough back so the snow coming off the plow will not strike your garbage can. The garbage men will step onto your property to retrieve the can.

Adhering to these guidelines will make the job of the Public Works Department much easier and will provide residents with the best possible service during snow events.

Water & Sewer Project Updates



In October, the township’s Water & Sewer and DPW staff installed a water main and fire hydrant along Birchwood Road. This new fire hydrant is necessary to improve fire protection for this neighborhood. This project will not include any new water services to residents at this time. All disturbed areas will be fully restored in the spring 2024.



A Letter from the Superintendent

I am thankful our students, families, and community are having a fantastic start to the 2023 – 2024 calendar year. Already this school year, we have had many successes to celebrate in our academic, athletic, art, and extracurricular programs. The full spectrum of opportunities we provide, supports each child individually, and our greatest strength in Randolph is our ability to offer a holistic education. The inclusive approaches we take are why we continue to be a nationally ranked school system.

As a highly rated "A" district, Randolph Township Schools is ranked 748 out of 10,932 public school districts in America. As one of the top 7%, Randolph was assessed based on the quality of our educators, academics, college preparation, health & safety, athletics, clubs & activities, diversity, test scores, and a variety of other factors. Randolph Athletics is also a leader in producing exceptional teams ranking 733 out of 10,346 school districts. The district also scored high marks for the excellent academic opportunities we provide, the quality of our educators, and college preparation.

We have also been able to celebrate many Advanced Placement successes with 164 students being honored with one of the College Board’s Advanced Placement Scholar awards in 2023. Advanced Placement Scholar awards are given to students who receive scores of three or higher on three or more Advanced Placement Exams.

By scoring a three or higher, students are eligible to receive college credits, something for which our entire team and I are extremely proud. Additionally, our students had an impressive 89.49% passage rate out of the 870 exams taken. The overall passage rate rebounded from the COVID-19 pandemic, and the total number of Advanced Placement students continues to increase despite the high school’s decline in population.

Each school in our district consistently demonstrates excellence. While I've emphasized certain data points showcasing the outstanding performance of our school community, our foremost priorities always revolve around the social, emotional, and mental health resources we offer to our students. Over the course of the school year, within our facilities and classrooms, we design lessons that enable the creation of opportunities for nurturing healthy relationships, which are fundamental for sustaining positive learning environments. Our dedicated staff consistently goes the extra mile, and the district's success directly mirrors the significant time and effort our staff invest in both student achievement and individual growth.

We look forward to continued success and I hope our entire community has a wonderful holiday season.

RRS Standbys: Practical and Beneficial Community Service

Randolph Rescue Squad (RRS) members are caring, highly-trained volunteers dedicated to the well-being of those who live, work, visit, attend school, and do business here in Randolph Township. Answering emergency calls is the most prominent aspect of our community service. However, providing standbys is a major activity that benefits every segment of our community.

Standbys give RRS members the opportunity to meet and communicate with non-members, minus the anxiety that accompanies an EMS ambulance call. Randolph residents are used to seeing the RRS tent, first aid station, and ambulance stationed at the Fourth of July Freedom Festival, Country Fair, Wellness Fair, Arts in the Park, Gottesman RTW Academy Touch a Truck day, and at our Food Truck Festivals at CCM. RRS crews support our township firefighters on scene at live burns. Residents needing ambulance transport to or from health care facilities realize they can contact us and schedule that service free of charge.

Standbys are provided for school-related activities such as athletic competitions and relays, field days, high school and middle school graduations, and during the Under the Stars band festival. Perhaps you have attended parades in Boonton or Mendham where our RRS crew maintains standby stations while those other volunteers march with their townspeople. The Randolph Rocks 5K and Mission Gratitude events also involve RRS assistance.

Randolph Police News

Millbrook Avenue and Quaker Church Road Crash Study Update

In 2022, after noticing an uptick in motor vehicle crashes at the intersection of Millbrook Avenue and Quaker Church Road, the Randolph Police Department's Support Service Unit initiated a crash study of the intersection. This led to a joint effort between the Morris County Road Department and the Randolph Township Engineering office.

In November of 2022, "GPI", an engineering company contracted by Morris County, performed a traffic study at the intersection. In early 2023, GPI submitted their recommendations to make the intersection safer. The crash study revealed that almost all "right angle" crashes involved a vehicle traveling east on Quaker Church Road. Changes to the intersection include the installation of a concrete median in the southwest corner, and two stop signs for traffic going eastbound on Quaker Church Road, approaching the intersection with Millbrook Avenue. "Stop Ahead" and "Stop" are now stenciled on the roadway, along with rumble strips to alert drivers that there is a stop ahead. The County plans to install more signage and the flashing beacon will also be updated to include larger alternating lights.

The police department is hopeful that these changes will help reduce the number of crashes at the Millbrook Avenue and Quaker Church Road intersection.



School Bus Safety

The Randolph Police Department would like to remind motorists, "If the lights are flashing, don't try passing." Since the 2019-2020 school year, every Randolph Township school bus has been equipped with multiple cameras. If a driver passes a stopped school bus with its red lights flashing, the cameras will capture it and a summons will be issued. Don't be the next one to receive a summons. Let's keep our students safe. Do not illegally pass a school bus.

Snow Removal Ordinance

Local Ordinance #44-82 states that if the sidewalk in front of your house is on a "Designated Walking Route" for school children, you are required to clear the sidewalks of any snow or ice accumulation within 12 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event. If your sidewalk is not on a designated walking route, it must still be cleared within 24 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event.

Local Ordinance #44-81 states that no person shall place, cause to be placed, or permit to be placed, any snow or ice upon any street, road or sidewalk within the township in any manner that will obstruct or impede vehicular or pedestrian traffic, or block any access to any street, road or sidewalk.

Fire Department News

Santa Claus is coming to town, and so is your fire department. On December 16, Santa and his helpers will be driving around town with the Randolph Township Fire Department (RTFD). When you hear them coming, be sure to come outside to meet Santa and his RTFD helpers! If you would like to ride with Santa next year, ask one of the helpers or visit www.randolphfire.org to see how you can join.

Randolph Chemical Engine Company No. 2, 340 State Route 10, will be having their annual Christmas Tree sale. Come out and support Co. 2 and decorate your home for the holidays with a tree from the fire department.

As we transition into winter and colder weather, make sure your furnace is working properly. If you are using a fireplace, be sure that the chimney is clean and safe to use. If you see or smell smoke or any foreign odors when you turn on your heating system, call 911 to notify the fire department, as there may be a problem that could lead to an emergency situation.

We hope everyone has a warm and safe winter! Some winter fire safety tips:

- 1) Have your furnace inspected.
- 2) Check and/or clean your chimneys and vents.
- 3) Test your smoke and CO2 detectors.
- 4) Be cautious when using space heaters and follow manufacturer directions.
- 5) Cover your fireplace with a screen/glass door.
- 6) Use caution with lit candles and blow them out prior to leaving a room.

Remember to use caution when driving in adverse conditions.

Community Support Programs

Winter Termination Program

If you are having trouble paying your residential electric, sewer and water service bills this winter, the NJ Department of Community Affairs has a program to protect you from having these utilities turned off from November 15, 2023 through March 15, 2024.

Who is Eligible?

You qualify for protection during this period if you are being helped by one of the programs listed below:

- Federal Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP)
- Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF)
- Federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled (PAAD)
- General Assistance (GA) benefits
- Universal Service Fund (USF)
- Low-income Household Water Assistance Program
- Lifeline Credit Program

OR

You are unable to pay your utility bills because of circumstances beyond your control such as unemployment, illness, medically related expenses, recent death of an immediate family member, and any other circumstances, which might cause financial hardship.

What do you have to do?

1. If you qualify for protection from shut-off during this period, you should contact your utility company to advise the company that you are eligible for coverage under the State's Winter Termination Program. You should also pay as much as you can on your bill(s) during the winter.
2. Customers also have the option to complete the following Self-Certification form and provide this form to their utility company as a way of notifying the company of their eligibility for protection. When using the Self-Certification form it is recommended that a copy of the form be retained for one's personal records.

Please note that completion and submission of the Self-Certification form to your utility company is NOT required in order to receive protection under the Winter Termination Program. Protection under the Winter Termination Program can be obtained by verbally advising your utility company(ies) of your eligibility or by submitting this Self-Certification form to the utility company. In either case, please contact your utility company's customer service number to report your eligibility and/or learn how it wishes to receive the Self-Certification form. You should also log onto DCAid: <https://dcaid.dca.nj.gov/en-US/are-you-eligible> or contact NJ211 at 211 or 1-877-652-1148 for possible assistance with your utilities.

Energy Assistance Help

New Jersey Natural Gas is able to connect you with grants and resources to help pay your energy bills and manage your energy costs. Maximum income guidelines are higher than you may expect. A family of four making up to \$141,384 may qualify.

Historical Society of Old Randolph

In 1853, there were nine documented schools in six school districts within Randolph Township: Mount Freedom, Center Grove, Millbrook, Shongum, Wolfe, and Ironia-Succasunna. Since the majority of the pupils were from farming families, if they were needed at home for chores, they did not attend school. However, rainy days, snow on the ground, and freezing weather were not excuses for a pupil to remain at home. There were no school buses, so they walked. Former Randolph resident and teacher Sarah Miller documented in the book, A History of Randolph Township, that when her father was a boy, he used to ice skate from his home on Calais Road to the Wolfe School House, which was located on the corner of Doby Road and Combs Hollow Road. Sarah noted that in 1904 Randolph's Board of Education mandated all teachers be in their classrooms no later than 8:30 a.m. on days when the school room needed to be warmed up by either a wood or coal burning stove located in a corner of the room, usually near a window. This task required a lot of effort and generally took some time before the teacher could get the room warm enough for the children during the late fall and winter. Classes started at 9:00 a.m. and dismissed at 4:00 p.m., except for Fridays, when the children were dismissed at 3:30 p.m.

Randolph Township Recycling Guidelines

Recyclables must be placed curbside no later than 6:00 am; ideally they should be put out the night before collection. Recyclables must be placed in reusable containers, NOT in plastic bags. In the event of inclement weather, please visit www.randolphnj.org or call the Health Department at 973-989-7050 to determine if curbside collection has been canceled..

Acceptable recycling materials for curbside collection

ALL of these items can be placed together in ONE container:	ACCEPTABLE – <i>All must be empty, free of food debris, and rinsed</i>
Household Plastic Containers	Plastic containers numbered 1, 2, & 5 , juice boxes and other wax coated beverage cartons.
Aluminum & Metal Cans	Aluminum foil wrap, foil trays, and foil juice pouches. Includes aluminum, tin and steel food cans.
Glass Bottles & Jars	Clear, green/blue & brown beverage and food containers.
Newspapers, Magazines, Catalogs, Books, and Phonebooks	Includes ads, inserts, postcards, hard cover, soft cover, and miscellaneous paper.
Cardboard (corrugated/chip board)	All corrugated paper materials, chipboard: cereal boxes, gift boxes, scrap paper, egg cartons, paper cups, paper tubes, and wrapping paper.
Mixed Office Paper	Includes mail, envelopes, copy paper, office paper, and greeting cards.

Acceptable items to be dropped off at the Recycling Center

These items may be dropped off at the Recycling Center for no fee, or call the Health Department to arrange for curbside pickup (a fee may be charged). If you have questions about whether an item is acceptable, please call the Health Department.

RECYCLABLE ITEM	ACCEPTABLE
Electronic Waste	Televisions, computers, laptops, monitors, computer peripherals such as keyboards and mice, fax machines, VCRs and radios.
White Goods/Appliances/Metal	Large household appliances: stoves, refrigerators, washers, dryers, dishwashers, etc. Metal includes lawn chair frames and filing cabinets.
Grass Clippings	Available seasonally.
Brush/Tree Branches	Basic yard debris. Maximum acceptable branch size is 4 feet in length by 4 inches in diameter. (No stumps)
Christmas Trees	Trees must be bare, with no stands, plastic bags, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. (Trees put out after January 8th WILL NOT be picked up by the township. Trees can be dropped off any time during normal working hours at the Recycling Center)
Leaves	Fall curbside collection per Department of Public Works schedule.
Tires – automobile, truck, and bike tires	Up to four tires. Remove steel rims which also can be recycled with metal.
