


2024 AND PRIOR YEAR(S) OPEN PROPERTY TAX AND WATER AND SEWER CHARGES

As the year comes to a close, please be sure that your tax and water and sewer charges are paid up-to-date. All open 2024 and prior year balance(s) will be subject to further action including but not limited to, tax sale and water shut off. If your open charges are subject to tax sale, a lien will be placed on your property. If your 2024 charges remain open, are over \$10,000.00 and extend into 2025, they will be subject to a 6% year-end penalty in addition to established interest. For information regarding your payoff amount or if you have questions, please contact the tax department at 973-989-7048/7047 OR the water and sewer department at 973-989-7063.

ONLINE AND AUTOMATIC PAYMENTS FOR PROPERTY TAX AND WATER AND SEWER CHARGES

Randolph Township is very pleased to announce that effective January 1, 2025 enhancements will be made to our online payment portal. If you are currently participating in the automatic payment/direct debit program you MUST re-enroll to continue the program. Current participants will be receiving notification regarding how to re-enroll. Randolph Economic Development Committee (EDC)

The Randolph Economic Development Committee (EDC) has been very active with several business support activities over the past several months.

In September, we participated in the annual Randolph Country Fair where we staffed an informational booth. We proudly handed out our annual Randolph Rewards Coupon Book. This booklet is filled with offers and discounts from many local businesses. If you did not have an opportunity to receive a booklet, the offers are available online at the Randolph EDC website, Randolphlocal.com. Most recently, we have been focused on two specific noteworthy activities.

First, we proudly selected and honored the 2024 EDC Business Award recipient The Restore, Morris Habitat for Humanity, located at 274 S Salem St in Randolph. This nonprofit creates a steady source of income for Morris Habitat by selling new and used furniture along with home furnishings donated by individuals and businesses. It promotes sustainability by diverting hundreds of tons of materials from the waste stream each year. Using volunteer labor and donations of money and used furniture, Morris Habitat for Humanity, a local nonprofit organization assists in building and rehabilitating houses in partnership with families in need.

Second, we have been diligently contacting and visiting local businesses to build a database recognizing local businesses that offer, support and employ veterans. The EDC recognizes and values the contributions and sacrifices of veterans and first responders; and launched its annual Veterans Discount Program and social media campaign in November. The program provides a summary of local Randolph businesses that offer veterans and/or first responders discounts listed on the EDC website, randolphlocal.com. New Hire Spotlight


Courtney Sartain

The Historical Society of Old Randolph

For twenty-nine years and thirty summers, Mr. Dante Franchi operated his hotel, 'Casa Marino' on nearly thirty-nine acres of land located on top of the hill on the northern side of Fords Road. The hotel was originally built as a summer home in 1925 for Mr. Allen Strauss, a Brooklyn, New York City haberdasher. The architecture of the structure was similar to the Arts and Crafts style model homes in Mountain Lakes, New Jersey by developer and entrepreneur Herbert J. Hapgood. The hotel had 3 floors and 18 guest rooms. The interior boasted polished chestnut wood walls, and Mr. Franchi constructed a custom chestnut wood bar where popular cocktails and other beverages were served to the guests. The huge kitchen would offer to store and then serve venison for supper to deer hunting guests during the fall and winter seasons. Water from the Mill Brook fed a pond on the property that was used for guests' ice-skating pleasure in the winter. The water source obtained for the hotel was from the Mill Brook and a well on the property. Casa Marino eventually closed and was razed; the property then made way for a residential development.




Prevent Frozen Water Meters and Pipes This Winter

Cold weather is ahead of us! It is the time to safeguard your home by preventing water damage from frozen pipes and water meters that bring costly repairs. Take a few simple precautions now!

- Turn off outside faucets. Disconnect the hose. If you are going to be away for the winter, turn off the water from inside your house and drain the pipe.
- Never completely shut off the heat when you are away. If you are planning to leave your home for an extended period of time and you don't drain your pipes, lower the thermostat, but never shut it off. The lack of heat can freeze the pipes in the walls and basement. Freezing bursts the pipes and, when the house warms up, the thawing water will cause flooding and significant damage.
- Patch any cracks and holes in doors, windows, and walls near pipes. When the temperature drops to near zero, a high wind blowing through a small opening can freeze a nearby pipe, even though the temperature in the room is 70°F.
- Insulate water meters, pipes, and faucets in unheated areas. Wrap pipes with pipe-insulating material, which is available at hardware stores.

If you should experience frozen pipes, **DO NOT USE A TORCH WITH AN OPEN FLAME TO THAW**. The easiest and safest way to thaw a frozen pipe is to heat the room or use a hair dryer. Set the dryer on low heat and wave the warm air back and forth along the pipe. Placing a warm towel or rag around the pipe may also do the trick. Remember, the pipe may already be broken and, when the water is thawed, it will leak.

Be prepared by taking precautions now. Have your furnace regularly serviced, insulate drafty areas, inspect your plumbing, be familiar with your plumbing system, know where your inside water shut off valve is located and verify that it is working properly. Make sure you have the name and telephone number of your plumber handy. Being prepared for the cold can keep you from being left out in the cold without water this winter.

Christmas Tree Collection

The Randolph Township Public Works Department will be picking up residents' Christmas trees this holiday season. The trees must be bare, with no stands, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. Christmas trees must be put out at the curb no later than January 7th.

Trees put out later than this date WILL NOT be picked up by the township. However, Christmas trees will be accepted at the Recycling Center anytime during normal working hours.



A Letter from the Superintendent

Randolph Learning Community,

The Board of Education held a bond referendum on September 17, 2024 for proposed renovations and enhancements to all six district schools. The Morris County Clerk's Office counted all ballots. Anna McMahon, Deputy Morris County Clerk, certified the results on behalf of the county on September 26, 2024. Randolph Township residents approved the referendum proposed to the public for consideration. As previously shared, the scope of approved projects includes full roof replacements at Shongum Elementary and Ironia Elementary, art room renovations at all six school buildings, music room renovations at Randolph Middle School, HVAC/UV replacements, districtwide restroom renovations, and security upgrades in every school. Randolph Township Schools will enter the next phase of selling bonds and seek competitive construction bids. Construction could begin as soon as the summer of 2025 for certain projects. All the projects have an expected completion of approximately 3-4 years. Each project will be scheduled to ensure as little disruption to the normal operation of our school buildings as possible. Randolph Township Schools and the Board of Education thanks the public for its participation in the community vote. The district will continue to share relevant updates in the coming weeks and years as all the approved projects are completed.

Throughout the process of developing this referendum, many stakeholders were involved who played a pivotal role in the selection of these necessary projects. I am proud that our team was able to develop a project scope that maximized debt service aid to generate an influx of funding which otherwise could not have been provided without a voter approved bond referendum. The approved projects, once completed, will impact generations of current and incoming Randolph students, staff, and families. Our district has and continues to be an educational leader in both teaching and learning, and these approved projects will only help us continue that tradition of success. I look forward to next steps, and again thank the public and all stakeholders involved for supporting these necessary renovations and enhancements in our school community.

We look forward to continued success as a school community as we partner with our families and community stakeholders. I hope our entire community has a wonderful, relaxing holiday season. We have so much to look forward to in 2025 and the years to come.

Police Department News

Snow Removal Ordinance

Local Ordinance #44-82 states that if the sidewalk in front of your house is on a "Designated Walking Route" for school children, you are required to clear the sidewalks of any snow or ice accumulation within 12 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event. If your sidewalk is not on a designated walking route, it must still be cleared within 24 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event.

Local Ordinance #44-81 states that no person shall place, cause to be placed, or permit to be placed any snow or ice upon any street, road or sidewalk within the township in any manner that will obstruct or impede vehicular or pedestrian traffic, or block any access to any street, road or sidewalk.

ARRIVE Together Program

In October, the Randolph Police Department became the latest police department in Morris County to become part of the "ARRIVE Together Program". The goal of the ARRIVE Together Program is to provide individuals in crisis with the help they need as quickly and effectively as possible by teaming up a police officer with a mental health specialist to respond to 9-1-1 calls relating to a mental health crisis. The ARRIVE Together screener will follow up on these calls to determine if additional support is needed.

The ARRIVE Together Program was originally tested by the New Jersey State Police in Cumberland County in December 2021. The program in Morris County is being coordinated through the Morris County Prosecutor's Office in partnership with the Mental Health Association of Morris & Essex County. The program is currently operational Monday through Friday from 7 AM to 3 PM, with the mental health specialist rotating between the Randolph Police Department and other participating police departments.

Join Us & Be a Helpful Hero in Randolph!

In past Randolph Quarterly articles, this request appears in the last paragraph. Now, however, this sincere request comes FIRST! What could possibly prompt a person to join the Randolph Rescue Squad (RRS)? Our applicants are unique and genuinely motivated. People of all ages are welcome and needed – new residents, seasoned "old timers" – parents, children, siblings, uncles, aunts – students, retirees, friends, employees in widely varied businesses and occupations. The unifying factor is their willingness to care for people in need of emergency medical assistance. Simply put, one young member stated, "I want to help my community. It is very rewarding to see patients improve with the care we give them."

Check out the RRS website at www.randolphrescue.org. Membership categories include Adult/Active, Junior Program, and Auxiliary. In addition to submitting the application, scan the other information given about training, meetings, and so forth. You will be contacted about an interview after the application is reviewed. CPR instruction is required for all crew members and provided onsite. The NJ State training and EMT certification process will be explained. Since 1967, the primary responsibilities of the Randolph Rescue Squad have included responding to 911 emergency calls, assisting at fire scenes, standing by at community meetings, athletic competitions, participating in the annual 4th of July Parade, Freedom Festival and at the Country Fair. Additionally, we give EMS presentations at our headquarters and at other locations in Randolph for groups such as scouts, community organizations, and touch-a-truck events. We are always prepared to help our Randolph Township residents, students, businesses, friends, and visitors.

Give yourself the opportunity to JOIN OUR TEAM. We are optimistic and hope you will become a member. We'll support your training and welcome you as a member of this vital community service organization. We also promise to



applaud enthusiastically at the meeting when you take the oath of office as a member of the Randolph Rescue Squad. Reward yourself with a sense of satisfaction and pride. Extend your life skills. Become a better listener, collaborator, and leader. Learn about and respect those who face difficult health challenges.

Thank you for your generous donations which enable us to maintain our mission of providing exceptional, and completely volunteer first aid services to Randolph Township without fee charges.

Randolph Township Recycling Guidelines

Recyclables must be placed curbside no later than 6:00 AM; ideally they should be put out the night before collection. Recyclables must be placed in reusable containers, NOT in plastic bags. In the event of inclement weather, please visit www.randolphnj.org or call the Health Department at 973-989-7050 to determine if curbside collection has been canceled.

Acceptable recycling materials for curbside collection

ALL of these items can be placed together in ONE container:		ACCEPTABLE – All must be empty, free of food debris, and rinsed
Household Plastic Containers		Plastic containers numbered 1, 2, & 5, juice boxes and other wax coated beverage cartons.
Aluminum & Metal Cans		Aluminum foil wrap, foil trays, and foil juice pouches. Includes aluminum, tin and steel food cans.
Glass Bottles & Jars		Clear, green/blue & brown beverage and food containers.
Newspapers, Magazines, Catalogs, Books, and Phonebooks		Includes ads, inserts, postcards, hard cover, soft cover, and miscellaneous paper.
Cardboard (corrugated/chip board)		All corrugated paper materials, chipboard: cereal boxes, gift boxes, scrap paper, egg cartons, paper cups, paper tubes, and wrapping paper.
Mixed Office Paper		Includes mail, envelopes, copy paper, office paper, and greeting cards.

These items should NOT be included in single stream recycling:

- ✓ Plastic bags
- ✓ Scrap metal
- ✓ Paint, paint or aerosol cans, pesticides, or oil
- ✓ Shredded Paper
- ✓ Household Batteries
- ✓ Pizza boxes
- ✓ Food or yard waste
- ✓ Fabrics or clothing
- ✓ Electronics
- ✓ Syringes
- ✓ VHS/VCR tapes
- ✓ Window panes or mirrors
- ✓ Ceramics or dishware
- ✓ PVC
- ✓ Light bulbs
- ✓ Drinking glasses
- ✓ Plastics numbered 3, 4, 6 & 7
- ✓ Bio-hazardous waste

Acceptable items to be dropped off at the Recycling Center

These items may be dropped off at the Recycling Center for no fee, or call the Health Department to arrange for curbside pickup (a fee may be charged). If you have questions about whether an item is acceptable, please call the Health Department.

RECYCLABLE ITEM	ACCEPTABLE
Electronic Waste	Televisions, computers, laptops, monitors, computer peripherals such as keyboards and mice, fax machines, VCRs and radios.
White Goods/Appliances/Metal	Large household appliances: stoves, refrigerators, washers, dryers, dishwashers, etc. Metal includes lawn chair frames and filing cabinets.
Grass Clippings	Available seasonally.
Brush/Tree Branches	Basic yard debris. Maximum acceptable branch size is 4 feet in length by 4 inches in diameter. (No stumps)
Christmas Trees	Trees must be bare, with no stands, plastic bags, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. (Trees put out after January 7th WILL NOT be picked up by the township. Trees can be dropped off any time during normal working hours at the Recycling Center)
Leaves	Fall curbside collection per Department of Public Works schedule.
Tires – automobile, truck, and bike tires	Up to four tires. Remove steel rims which also can be recycled with metal.
