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Township Holds Annual Volunteer Appreciation Event

The township acknowledged and thanked those who have volunteered their time in support of township boards and committees at the annual Volunteer Appreciation event held in January.

The township is supported by 14 Boards and Advisory Committees comprised of over one hundred resident volunteers. The Mayor and Council presided over a ceremony at the event recognizing those volunteers who achieved year-of-service milestones and who concluded their service terms in the past year. Special awards were also presented to an Outstanding Volunteer nominated by their peers and to the families of two long-time volunteers who passed away in 2019.

The Outstanding Volunteer Award was presented to Evelyn Hammaren. Evelyn has been a member of the Randolph Library Board of Trustees since the early 1980s; the last four years she has served as the Board Secretary. During her years of volunteer service, she brought to the Board the perspective of both a library patron and a library professional as she was a librarian at Randolph High School for many years. As a Board member, Evelyn actively championed the creation of the Teen Zone, the library expansion, including the extension of the large meeting room and creation of the Water Wall reading area. In 2017, she served on the sub-committee that oversaw the selection of the new Library Director. Through her dedication and enthusiastic support for the Randolph Library, Evelyn Hammaren personifies the criteria that define an outstanding volunteer in Randolph Township.

The two awards presented in memoriam went to the families of John Jerow and Ethan Blynn. John Jerow was a member of the Planning Board from 1999 until his passing earlier this year. John also served as a volunteer member of the Library Board of Trustees for many years. Ethan Blynn served as a member of the Parks Advisory and Economic Development committees for many years. He also served as a liaison from the Parks Committee to the Wildlife Management Advisory Committee and Parks & Recreation Master Plan Steering Committee. Prior to his municipal volunteer service, Ethan served multiple terms as a member of the Board of Education. Both John and Ethan were true civic leaders and they will be missed.

Managing the Impact of Wildlife in the Community

As Randolph has grown over the years, managing the balance between human activity and wildlife has become an ever increasing challenge for our community. In response to the challenge, the Township Council initiated the Wildlife Management Advisory Committee (WMAC). The WMAC is a committee comprised of seven citizen volunteers appointed by the Township Council which provides advice and input on a variety of wildlife matters and oversees the deer control program for the township.

The committee, through the Department of Parks, Recreation and Community Services, maintains a comprehensive listing of municipal open space lands, issues access permits to hunters to hunt on these lands, and reports deer harvest totals to the Township Council at the end of each hunting season. It also maintains a list of licensed hunters who are available to hunt on private property.

In recent years, as sightings of black bear, coyote and other wildlife have increased, the committee has expanded its activities to include education and outreach to better inform residents on how to safely co-exist with wildlife in the community. The education effort has emphasized the importance of not feeding wild animals and protecting pets (especially cats and small dogs) from confrontation with larger wildlife.

Despite the township's efforts to educate, the problem with wildlife feeding on private property remains an issue impacting many residential neighborhoods. Wildlife feeding changes the behavior of non-domestic animals and negatively impacts people and the neighborhoods in which they live. Feeding brings wildlife closer to people, putting individuals at risk to the communicable diseases carried by animals, as well as attracting animals such as bears and coyotes that potentially pose a threat to both people and pets. Wildlife feeding also encourages animals to congregate in larger numbers resulting in the concentration of animal waste, damage to residential property, shrubbery, and gardens, and a greater potential for vehicle-animal accidents.

To address this issue, the Township Council enacted an ordinance a few years ago which prohibits the feeding of wildlife on private property. The ordinance, which is enforced by the Police and Health departments, restricts the feeding of any wild animal with the exception of birds. The ordinance is designed not to be punitive, with language stipulating that first offenders will be issued warnings, and violations (with the penalty of fine) will be issued only in the case of repeat offenders.

Residents interested in obtaining more information about the activities of the WMAC, the public hunt, or arranging for assistance with a hunt on private property should contact Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director Russ Newman at 973-989-7081. The WMAC also holds regular meetings which are open to the public; meeting dates are posted on the township website, www.randolphnj.org.

To minimize the likelihood of wildlife becoming a nuisance in your neighborhood:

- Avoid feeding pets outside. If you must, feed them only once per day and remove the food bowl as soon as your pet has finished its meal.
- If you compost, use enclosed bins and never include meat or fish scraps.
- Clean up spilled bird seed around feeders.
- Remove fallen fruit from the ground.
- Keep trash in high-quality containers with tight-fitting lids and place the cans curbside the morning of collection instead of the night prior.
- If wildlife does enter your yard, make sure they know they are not welcome by making loud noises, throwing rocks toward them, or spraying them with a garden hose.

Did you know? There are a number of property tax deductions/rebates available to homeowners who qualify.

The following programs are administered by the State of New Jersey.

Property Tax Reimbursement (Freeze)

This program is open to homeowners/mobile homeowners 65 or older, or receiving Social Security disability and meeting the qualifications. For more information please visit state.nj.us/treasury/taxation/ptr/ or call 1-800-882-6597.

Homestead Rebate

April is Oral Cancer Awareness Month

Oral cancer includes cancer of the mouth and pharynx. Approximately 53,000 people will be diagnosed with oral cancer each year and 10,800 will die from the disease. Oral cancer can occur in adults at any age, but its prevalence increases with age and affects more than twice as many men as women. Risk factors include tobacco and alcohol use, the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV), age, and sun exposure.

According to the National Institutes of Health, early detection is important. An oral cancer screening performed by a dentist is a quick and painless way to detect early signs of cancer. Symptoms of oral cancer include a sore, irritation, lump or thickening in mouth, lip or throat; a white or red patch in mouth; sore throat or feeling something is caught in throat; difficulty chewing, swallowing or speaking; difficulty moving jaw or tongue; numbness in tongue or other areas of mouth; swelling of jaw that causes dentures to fit poorly or become uncomfortable; and ear pain.

The Randolph Township Health Department will be providing a free oral cancer screening on Tuesday, April 21st from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. in the Municipal Building. Dr. Edward Smith and Dr. Scott Smith will be performing this screening. Appointments are required; please call 973-989-7050 to schedule an appointment.

Youth Mental Health First Aid USA is an eight-hour public education program which introduces participants to the unique risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems in adolescents, explains the importance of early intervention, and teaches individuals how to help an adolescent in crisis or experiencing a mental health challenge. Just as CPR helps you assist an individual having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid helps you assist someone experiencing a mental health or substance use-related crisis. The course is designed for adults who regularly interact with adolescents (teachers, school staff, coaches, youth group leaders, parents, etc.). American Flag Disposal Information

Do you know what you should do with a worn or torn U.S. Flag? Any U.S. Flag that is faded, torn, or frayed should be replaced with a new U.S. Flag. Worn out flags can be brought to the Randolph VFW Post on Carrell Road and dropped in the red, white and blue collection box located next to the building. Flags are collected throughout the year and then properly retired during a solemn ceremony usually performed on the Thursday prior to Flag Day, June 14th.



The Randolph Police Department recently hired two new police officers who have joined the patrol division.

From a young age, Patrolman Kevin Gocklin had a passion for a career in law enforcement. Following his completion at the Passaic County Police Academy in September 2019, Patrolman Gocklin was sworn in as an officer in the department.

Fire Department - Volunteers Needed

Doing good makes you feel good – volunteer today!

The Randolph Township Fire Department is comprised of on-call volunteers responding to community needs 24 hours per day/7 days per week. We operate out of four stations: Millbrook Station 2, Mount Freedom Station 3, Ionia Station 4, and Shongum Mountain Station 5. Our firefighters respond to over 675 calls to service annually. We need your help! Like many communities across the country, volunteerism is declining. We need citizens who are willing to put in the time and effort to serve their community as junior firefighters, firefighters, or associate members. We provide all of the equipment and training you will need to successfully operate as a firefighter. To be fully qualified as a firefighter, it takes the average person approximately 18 months, with over 140 hours of training.

A junior firefighter is a Randolph resident between 16-17 years of age. Junior firefighters train, respond to calls, and perform the non-hazardous duties of a firefighter. These young volunteers play a major role in supporting our firefighters. Junior firefighters are also eligible to attend the Junior Fire academy in the summer and get a jump on future firefighting training.

A firefighter is a Randolph resident 18 years of age or older who can successfully complete a township-provided physical as well as the required State of New Jersey Firefighter 1 training within 18 months of becoming a probationary member. Firefighter 1 prepares a probationary firefighter for responding to fires, hazardous material calls, vehicle accidents, car fires and fire alarms. Firefighters who are in good standing and respond to calls are eligible for annual benefits such as a clothing allowance, access to the Randolph YMCA and Randolph Beach, and a discount on uniforms and animal licenses.

Passing Stopped School Buses

The Randolph Police Department and the Randolph Township School District's Transportation Department have been working together in an attempt to decrease the number of vehicles passing stopped school buses. As part of this effort, officers from the police department have followed buses in unmarked police vehicles, and have positioned themselves to observe the bus stops for which they have received multiple complaints. The transportation department has equipped many of the buses in its fleet with high-definition cameras that capture the vehicle and its license plate as it passes a stopped school bus. The transportation department files a report with the police department, which then requires the violator to appear in Randolph Municipal Court. As of February 21, 2020, there have been 48 such reports filed with the police department. As passing a stopped school bus is a serious motor vehicle violation, the Randolph Police Department would like to remind drivers of the consequences. The violation carries five points, a minimum of \$100 in fines, and the possibility of up to 15 days in jail or 15 days of community service; a violator's driver's license can also be revoked. Since the safety of the children in our community is a priority, we urge you to drive cautiously and obey the law by stopping for stopped school buses when their red lights are flashing.


Time Marches On...Commitment Continues

Quality of Life Ordinances Adopted in 2019

During 2019, the township adopted three ordinances which directly addressed quality of life issues.

The growing trend of short term rental of privately owned residential property began to impact the community in the past year or two. These short term rentals resulted in public nuisance/noise complaints, sanitation issues, overcrowding, and illegal parking, essentially converting residential dwelling units into de-facto hotels, motels, boarding houses and other commercial enterprises. Ordinance No. 16-19 established a restriction on the short term rental of residential dwelling units to a period of not less than 30 days.

Cargo containers, PODS and other storage structures began to proliferate in the township in recent years. Ordinance No. 17-19 regulates the time period these structures can be used (15 days in a calendar year or up to one year maximum if used in conjunction with a valid building permit), the size and the location on residential properties.

The parking of tractor trailers and similar vehicles on residential streets was a constant nuisance in several neighborhoods. Ordinance No. 21-19 prohibits the parking of large commercial vehicles at any time on a residential street except when engaged in loading or unloading, and only during the hours when work is being performed in the residential area.



Joel Farkas Presents: Remembering the Women of the American Revolution

Historian Joel Farkas is one of the most popular presenters at the Randolph Library. On Tuesday, March 31st at 7:00 p.m. he will present, "Remembering the Women of the American Revolution." In a letter dated March 31, 1776, Abigail Adams exhorted her husband John to "remember the ladies!" Be sure to join us as Joel presents a lively discussion about the women of the American Revolution.

Originally from Cincinnati, Ohio, Joel graduated from Ohio State University with a business degree. He then joined the army as an officer, and later was recruited by Kimberly Clark Corporation which brought him to New York. Unsatisfied with the corporate life, he purchased his own company and spent nearly 30 years happily running his own business and raising his family in Morris County.

While working in NYC in the 1970s, Joel saw a full-page advertisement placed by a department store in the NY Times announcing their "autograph sales department". His interest peaked, he purchased his first autograph (Frank Sinatra), and soon after began collecting autographs of our founding fathers.

After selling his business, Joel's interest in the formation of the United States took him to the National Park Service at Washington's Headquarters (the Ford Mansion) in Morristown, where he became a volunteer docent and tour guide. In this role, his "latent love of history" became his passion. Joel soon started giving lectures about the Revolutionary War at libraries, schools and civic organizations, continually trying to expand his knowledge and his lecture offerings.

Joel's goal is to make his presentations informative, entertaining and fun, and to prove that HISTORY DOES MATTER! For those who share his interest in the American Revolution, Joel recommends the following books: *Legends and Lies: The Patriots* by David Fisher; *The Whiskey Rebels* by David Liss; and *The American Revolution* series by Nathaniel Philbrick.

Trails Update

The township, guided by the Trails Advisory Committee, has engaged in a number of projects in the past year to support and enhance the community's 16-mile trail network. This work is highlighted by new trail maps to be released this spring. The new maps will feature color coded illustrations depicting the trail routes, as well as several other enhancements such as:

- Additional information regarding paving and steep slopes
- A separate inset showing the colored trails for ease of reading
- An inset of the Brundage Park trails for ease of reading
- The planned trails in Veterans Community Park – both the loop and connecting trails to Doby Road and Trout Brook Road
- A link to enable users to download the trail map to a mobile device which can then be expanded for clearer viewing

Training and Requirements for Sports Coaches

Mandatory for All Coaches!

Randolph Township Parks, Recreation & Community Services takes the safety and well being of the participants of our programs very seriously. Our programs would not be able to run without the many volunteer coaches who generously give their time to the participants. In recognition of the commitment of our volunteer coaches, there are no direct costs associated with their participation in these mandatory trainings and checks.

Rutgers SAFETY Clinic

As of November 1, 2019 all volunteer coaches must be certified through the Rutgers SAFETY Clinic. Certifications are designed to sensitize volunteer coaches to their responsibilities and hold them accountable to a strict code of conduct. In addition, after completing the clinic, volunteer coaches are afforded additional civil liability coverage. For information on Rutgers SAFETY certification, or to obtain a replacement card, visit their website at www.youthsports.rutgers.edu. Coaches must provide the recreation department with a copy of their certification.

To date, there are over 500 volunteers in Randolph already certified through the Rutgers SAFETY Clinic. Clinics are offered several times per year through the recreation department.

Background Checks for All Volunteer Coaches

In addition to the Rutgers SAFETY certification, all volunteers involved with youth-serving programs will be required to submit a Federal and State criminal history background check. Information for submitting a background check will be sent once the recreation department receives a list of recommended coaches from each program.

Volunteer Coach IDs

Volunteers involved with youth-serving programs will now be required to wear a recreation department issued photo ID at all activities in which youth are participating. These IDs will only be provided to those volunteers who have completed both the background check and the Rutgers SAFETY Clinic.

Water and Sewer Project Update

Woodlawn Terrace and Shuman Road Sanitary Sewer Installation Project

The Woodlawn Terrace and Shuman Road Sanitary Sewer Installation Project has been completed. The contractor responsible for the project, Shauger Group, completed the extension of sanitary sewers from Brookside Road to the Woodlawn Terrace and Shuman Road area. Residents in this area can now connect their homes to the new sanitary sewer system as well as the extended water system that was completed in 2017.

CCM and Meadowbrook Sanitary Sewer Pump Stations

Plans and specifications for improvements to the existing County College of Morris (CCM) and Meadowbrook pump stations are currently being completed for permitting and construction. Improvements will include pump replacements and upgrades to equipment and overall infrastructure. Construction is slated for fall/winter of this year.

Consumer Confidence Report

As a public water system, Randolph Township is obligated to issue a yearly Consumer Confidence Report related to the public water system. This report includes all required testing information and results for Randolph Township's water system, as well as our water provider, the Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority. The 2020 Consumer Confidence Report will be posted on the township website beginning May 15th; visit http://www.randolphnj.org/services/water_quality_report

Spring Branch Collection

The township will be conducting the annual spring branch collection beginning the week of April 20th. All branches need to be placed curbside by this date as it will be a **ONE TIME ONLY** pick up. No return trips will be made. This collection usually takes four weeks to complete.

Branch collection is limited to **ONE LOAD** per property owner, approximately four cubic yards (roughly 5 ft. long x 4 ft. wide x 5 ft. high). Branches can be no longer than four feet in length and three inches in diameter. This does not include LEAVES, VINES, STUMPS, and BUILDING MATERIALS, or any other non-chippable items.

Loads larger than the guidelines listed above can be removed through the special brush collection policy by contacting the Engineering Office at 973-989-7066. There is a **\$150 FEE** for this additional service.

Street Sweeping


The township sweeps all of the township roads once the winter season is over. This operation is performed by our Department of Public Works and takes approximately three months to complete. Please do not deposit any large debris along the edge of the roadway that may enter the storm drains or hinder the sweeping operation.

Tree Trimming in the Township

Residents may be wondering why so many tree removal companies have been working in the community; there are two reasons for this work. JCP&L is trimming tree limbs near their wires in order to minimize future storm damage and power outages. In addition, the township contracts with these companies to remove dead trees in the township rights-of-way.

Adding to the traditional maintenance required by both JCP&L and the township to trees in the rights-of-way is the Emerald Ash Borer infestation. The Emerald Ash Borer is an insect pest from Eastern Asia that targets ash trees. Since its arrival in the United States approximately 10 years ago, it has infested and killed hundreds of thousands of these trees across the Midwest. The insect's presence was first identified in New Jersey in 2014. Once a tree is infested with the pest, it has an expected lifespan of three to four years. The infestation occurs when the insect's larvae tunnel into the trees, destroying the water and nutrient conducting tissues in the bark. To reduce the risk of these trees falling into the roadways and onto the power lines, both the township and JCP&L have been proactive in removing dead ash and other tree species from the rights-of-way.

With the arrival of spring around the corner, residents are encouraged to look at the trees on their own property and determine if any look like they are dying or dead and take action to have them removed. By doing so, you may prevent damage to your property during a future storm. Residents in need of further professional assistance regarding the identification, evaluation, treatment or removal of trees on their property are strongly encouraged to contact a qualified landscaper or arborist. Mulch

The delivery of fine shredded wood mulch will be available to residents from April through October. Each truckload contains approximately 6-8 cubic yards of mulch. If you are interested in having mulch delivered to your residence, please complete the order form below or visit the township website www.randolphnj.org to download and complete the form. Deliveries will be made every Thursday and Friday beginning the week of April 6th. There is a delivery charge of \$100 per truckload. No order will be processed without receipt of payment. As always, residents are welcome to pick up mulch free of charge at the Recycling Center on Sussex Turnpike. **Mulch is only available for pick up or delivery while supplies last.**

Zoning Q&A

Q. What types of construction require a Residential Zoning Permit?

A. Prior to the application for a building permit or the construction, erection, demolition or major alteration of any structure including, but not limited to, fences, decks, pools, sheds, building additions and interior alterations, a Zoning Permit shall be secured from the Zoning Officer.

Q. Can I store my commercial vehicles at my home?

A. You may store one commercially registered vehicle if it is a standard size van or pickup. Anything larger must be garaged. Please call the Zoning Officer for more details at 973-537-7128.

Q. Can I store my RV or boat at my home?

A. You may park such vehicles on your property as long as they are properly screened. Please call the Zoning Officer for the regulations.

Q. Can I sell my car from my home?

A. You may sell only one car at a time and it must be located on your property.

Q. Do I need a permit for a shed?

A. You must get zoning approval for any size shed. You must also get a building permit for a shed larger than 200 square feet.

Q. Can I put my shed anywhere on my property?

A. No, all freestanding accessory structures (i.e. pools, sheds, garages), must meet certain setbacks for your zone. Call the Zoning Officer for details.

Q. Can garden sheds 100 square feet or less be placed closer to the property lines?

A. Yes, each property may have one garden shed within the required setbacks up to five feet from a property line.

Q. What hours may residents and landscapers operate lawn mowers?

A. Lawn mowers with a muffler may be operated between the hours of 8:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m. weekdays and 9:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m. on weekends and legal holidays.

Q. Can I use heavy machinery in my yard on weekends?

A. No, construction with heavy machinery on weekends and at night is prohibited. Tree clearing, earth moving, and demolition are included, as well as all construction projects. The police will respond to any violations.

Q. When do I need a lot grading permit?

A. When land disturbance involves the construction of 1,000 square feet or more of new impervious area or 2,500 square feet or more of new soil disturbance, except for normal agricultural operations in connection with a farming operation. Contact the Engineering Department for details at 973-989-7066.

Q. Do I need a permit to cut down trees?

A. Yes, contact the Planning Department for details at 973-989-7080.

Q. Are there any additional requirements if my property is located near a river, stream, lake or any freshwater wetland or transition area?

A. Yes, NJDEP regulations limit the types of construction activities in these areas. It is recommended that residents review their proposed projects with the Engineering/Planning staff in the early planning phases.

Q. How far from my house must a pool be located?

A. In addition to rear and side yard setbacks, pools must be at least 12 feet from the principle structure.
