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Statewide Bag Ban Law Intended to Reduce Plastic Pollution in NJ

Starting May 4, 2022, New Jersey retail stores, grocery stores and food service businesses will not provide or sell single-use plastic carryout bags and polystyrene foam food service products. The law (P.L.202, c.117) enacted on November 4, 2020 bans plastic bags, as well as paper bags at grocery stores measuring more than 2,500 square feet. It also bans polystyrene foam food service products. The statewide ban will create an effective and uniform sustainable policy for all shoppers and business owners in NJ.

There are some exceptions, including bags used to contain or wrap fruits, vegetables, baked goods, uncooked meat, fish, or poultry. Bags for laundry or dry cleaning, as well as bags provided by a pharmacy to carry prescription drugs, will also still be allowed.

The reasoning behind the legislation is to cut down on plastic pollution in New Jersey. Most single-use plastic carry-out bags end up in landfills, are incinerated, or accumulate in the environment. The quality of waterways and oceans are negatively affected by the litter caused from plastic bags. Major contributors to the New Jersey economy such as the tourism, fishing, and shipping industries are also adversely impacted.


Residents are encouraged to bring their own (reusable) bags when headed to the grocery store or other retailer. Reusable carryout bags made of materials specified in the law provide a durable, hygienic, and environmentally-friendly alternative. Here are a few tips to help remember to bring your own bags when shopping:

1. Keep extra bags in the car.
2. Hang extra bags by the door or alongside coats and jackets.
3. Get some lightweight "packable" bags that pack into a small pouch to keep in your purse or pockets.
4. Put a sign on your door as a reminder.

We can all work together to reduce reliance on single-use products to ensure future generations have a clean and healthy environment in which to live, work, and play in. Banning or limiting the use of single-use plastic and paper carryout bags is a significant step in this effort.

Arts in the Park

New for 2022. After taking two years off due to COVID-19, Arts in the Park has been revamped and moved to Veterans Community Park. There will be shuttles available (locations TBD) to ensure a fun and safe experience for everyone.

Other acts include the Alborada Flamenco Show, Gypsy Funk Squad, and a mirror show presented by Laser Show USA. Stroll through the art tent to see local artists' masterful creations. The performance tent will host authors and other creatives discussing various topics throughout the day.

Artworks Studio will offer crafts as well as educational and entertaining demonstrations including culinary, woodcarving, epoxy, glassblowing, spoon carving, and kinetic dolls. The library staff will be leading StoryWalks and has arranged for Pete the Cat to attend the event!

Leading up to Arts in the Park, the Randolph Parks, Recreation and Community Services department will host Art Bingo at Veterans Community Park from May 2-18. From the Tax Office

Did you know? There are a number of property tax deductions/rebates available to homeowners who qualify.

The following programs are administered by the State of New Jersey:

Property Tax Reimbursement (Freeze)

This program is open to homeowners/mobile homeowners 65 or older, or receiving Social Security disability and meet the qualifications. The State treasury department began mailing the 2021 applications in February 2022. For more information please visit state.nj.us/treasury/taxation/ptr/ or call 1-800-882-6597.

Homestead Rebate

This program is open to NJ residents who own and occupied their home as their principal residence and meets the qualifications. At the time of this publication, the State Treasury Department has announced that eligible tax payers will be paid the 2018 benefit beginning May 2022. The following program is administered by the Tax Collection Office:

Senior Citizen, Disabled Person or Surviving Spouse

Spring Bulk
Collection Week
April 18 – April 22

The spring bulk collection week begins Monday, April 18th. Items must be placed curbside by 6:00 a.m. on Monday. Please note the collection is simply an extension of your one-item-of-bulk-trash per weekly curbside collection service available to residents throughout the year.

Blue Diamond will be through each street **one time** for this collection and will not make return trips. Household trash must be clearly separated from your bulk items. Bulk items should not be placed in a box; loose items must be in trash cans or disposable bags. Latex paint cans must be dried out. Place can(s) in a trash can or pour mixture of paint into garbage bag with kitty litter. Mixture must be almost solid.

Items accepted include non-metal furniture, couches, mattresses, box springs, rugs/carpeting (rolled and tied in four foot lengths). Items **never collected** during the bi-annual bulk collection and/or weekly curbside trash collection include all recyclable items (metal, paper, e-waste), prohibited items (hazardous waste, building materials, and items weighing more than 200 lbs.), and vegetative waste.

Starting a Successful Business in Randolph Involves Planning and the EDC

How does a business select a location and how does Randolph attract potential businesses to join our community?

Though it may seem like new businesses “simply arrive” in Randolph, many collective efforts take place behind the scenes between the township elected leadership, staff and the Economic Development Committee (EDC) to plan for, attract and recruit business to our township.

Beginning on the township level, at least once every ten years the Planning Board conducts a re-examination of the township’s Master Plan. Part of this review includes the goals and objectives for nonresidential development. The last re-examination in 2016 contained numerous recommendations for South Salem Street, Mt. Freedom and the Route 10 Corridor. In the years since, the Township Council has adopted a series of zoning ordinances for these areas to help achieve the goals contained in the plan.

Zoning regulations are administered by the township’s Division of Planning and Zoning. Property owners and their agents work with the department to identify potential businesses that are permitted by the zoning ordinance. Likewise, businesses contact the department to assess the zoning districts in which their businesses are permitted and the availability of properties for lease or purchase. The businesses assess the opportunity and potential success of operating in Randolph by analyzing data on property costs, area demographics and the ability to optimize a safe work-life balance for their employees.

In addition to a strong township support system, the EDC provides continuous support once a business is established in Randolph. The EDC provides numerous tools and guidance including a “new business handbook”; the opportunity to schedule a grand opening/ribbon cutting celebration; constant social media support, as well as many other ongoing efforts to promote and support local businesses within the community.

One of our newer business owners, Ryan Haug from Legal Leaf, stated, “The support from the township and the EDC has been great. We have seen an increase in people entering the store and the feedback on social media has been positive.”

The EDC continues to work hand-in-hand with the Division of Planning and Zoning to attract new businesses and to support the many businesses already open and thriving in our community. Paper Shredding

As part of Clean Communities Day, confidential paper shredding services will be offered to residents, free of charge, from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 23 at the Municipal Building parking lot. Pandemic safety guidelines will be in effect. Residents must have their NJ driver’s license available as proof of residency. Residents will be required to follow the traffic pattern, park where directed, and remain in their vehicles. A Department of Public Works employee will assist residents with their items.

This shredding service is:

- For Randolph residents only
- Personal, confidential documents generated in the home only (not commercial or home-business generated)
- Limited to three file boxes per household (file box = 1.5 cu feet)
- Confidential documents do not include junk mail and store flyers or solicitations. Please separate this material from confidential documents.
- Documents must be free of any metal clips, rings or binders and should not include any CDs, x-rays, plastic file folders, etc.

Police Department Hires New Officer

The Randolph Police Department recently welcomed Patrolman Michael DelRusso to their ranks. Patrolman DelRusso is originally from neighboring Roxbury Township. After graduating from Roxbury High School, he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps Reserves, where he achieved the rank of Corporal. While still serving in the Marine Corps Reserves, he began his law enforcement career in 2017 as a Corrections Officer with the Morris County Sheriff’s Office. In 2019, he graduated from the Morris County Police Academy and was hired by the Town of Clinton Police Department, where he served until December of 2021, when he was hired by the Randolph Township Police Department. Patrolman DelRusso is also a graduate of the County College of Morris and is currently pursuing his Bachelor’s Degree.



New Jersey Safe Passing Law

On August 5, 2021 New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy signed into law, the New Jersey Safe Passing Law, which is intended to reduce crashes between vehicles and other road users, such as pedestrians and bicyclists. This new law requires drivers to move over one lane or allow at least four feet of space when passing pedestrians and bicyclists if it is safe to do so. If it is not safe to do so, this law requires the passing driver to slow to 25 MPH. The New Jersey Safe Passing Law also covers people with mobility issues riding electric scooters or in wheelchairs, as well as people riding on skateboards. Drivers who fail to follow this new law may face a fine of \$100. A driver who causes bodily injury by failing to comply with the new law could face fines up to \$500 and have two motor vehicle points added to their driving record.

As always, we urge everyone to practice “safety first.” Be vigilant on behalf of yourself, family, friends, and our entire Randolph community.



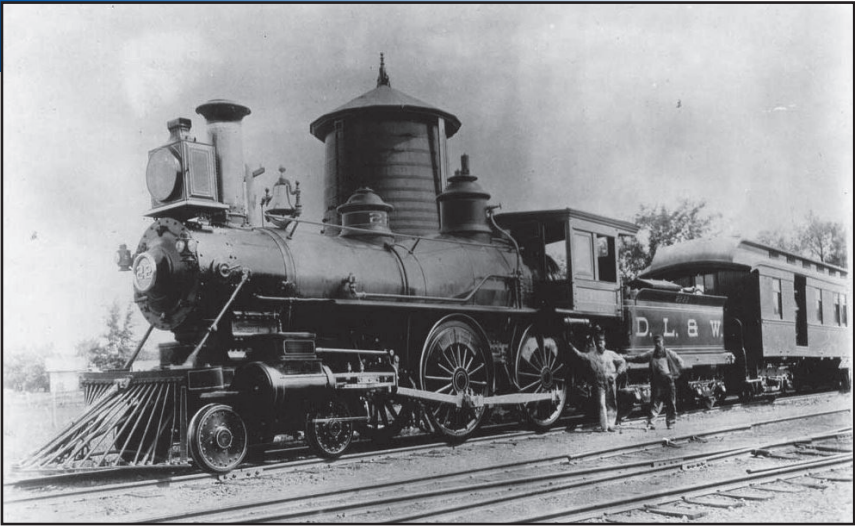

Randolph Historical Society

The Delaware, Lackawanna & Western (DL&W) Railroad Company included the Morris & Essex railway line, as well as the Chester Branch – chartered in 1867 and completed January 1, 1869. It was an adjunct to the Morris & Essex railway and was mainly for transportation of coal from the area’s mines. Eventually, there were trains transporting both freight and passengers.

The Chester Branch line was the only railway within Randolph’s borders, and seemingly gave Ironia a touch of sophistication compared to the other sections of the township with new sources of businesses and revenue. Besides providing faster U.S. postal service delivery, as well as shopping excursions to Dover, Morristown, Newark or even New York City, the DL&W Railroad Company decided to market its new Chester Branch Line for tourism. In 1893 a guidebook was printed listing the area as a great vacation spot for those seeking escape during the summer heat. Vannier’s Hotel located on the hill overlooking the Randolph-Succasunna border, as well as the Evergreen Park House, located on what is known today as Park Avenue, were among the first two resorts to fill quickly. Boarders also took advantage of vacant spare rooms in private homes for a week or long weekend stays. The guidebook advised, “the Chester Branch runs 11 miles westward thru a country famous for its rugged mountain peaks, green valleys, and brisk streams. This entire section of Morris County ranks among the most beautiful portions of New Jersey... The fertile farms offer every inducement to lovers of rest and quiet, and the hotels and boarding houses cater especially for city boarders... The water is pure and of good quality, the drives delightful and the air remarkably bracing.” Once in a while the passenger cars brought an interesting group of riders, such as the Railroad Christian Association in October 1878; that visit initiated approximately 30 more Ironia converts to their group.



The train pictured was built in 1884 and was utilized on the DL&W Railroad Company’s line of service through the first decade of the 1900s.

Parks and Recreation Master Plan

In July 2016, the Randolph Township Council adopted the Parks and Recreation Master Plan which provided an outline for developing and maintaining the Randolph parks system.

As we reach the halfway point of this plan, some major parks improvements have already taken place, which include:

- Replacement of seats, carpeting, and flooring at Brundage Park Playhouse.
- Replacement of ball field lights at Brundage Park.
- Replacement of existing artificial turf field and installation of additional artificial turf field at Freedom Park.
- Installation of new asphalt pad and ADA-accessible bleachers at Freedom Park.
- Improvement to drainage on baseball field at Freedom Park.
- Improvements to entrance of Freedom Park and overflow lot.
- Renovation of the basketball courts at Freedom Park.
- Fencing improvements at Freedom Park, Brundage Park and Heistein Park.
- Replacement and expansion of septic tanks at Heistein Park.
- Repaving of parking lot at Randolph Park.
- Renovation to building exteriors and snack bar, replacement of decking, and addition of first aid room at Randolph Park.
- Development of Veterans Community Park including community garden, pickleball courts, and lighted walking track.
- Completion of Trails Master Plan, designed and replaced trail markers, and published new trail maps.

Some improvements to look forward to in 2022-2026 include:

- Installation of exterior lighting and ADA-accessible doors at the Brundage Park Playhouse.
- Installation of ball field lights on softball field at Freedom Park.
- Installation of artificial turf field at Brundage Sussex.
- Replacement of ball field lights at Brundage Sussex.
- Installation of picnic pavilion at Randolph Park.
- Design of new Artworks Studio facility/facility improvements.

These projects are in addition to ongoing repairs and improvements such as fencing, ADA access, security cameras and parking lot lighting. By planning and continuing to improve our parks, we hope to provide many hours of enjoyment and activities for our residents and their families.

Water and Sewer Project Update

Farm Road and Arnold Drive Sanitary Sewer Installation Project:

The Farm Road and Arnold Drive Sanitary Sewer Installation Project has been awarded to a contractor with construction scheduled to begin in April 2022. This project will extend sanitary sewer service to 15 residents along Arnold Drive and Farm Road.

Meadowbrook and CCM Sanitary Sewer Pump Station Upgrades

Rehabilitation of the existing Meadowbrook Pump Station located on Meadowbrook Road has begun and is slated to be completed by spring 2022. The replacement of the existing County College of Morris (CCM) Pump Station located on the CCM campus is set for bidding in spring 2022 with construction anticipated in fall/winter 2022.

Fire Hydrant Replacement

The township continues our program to replace existing older fire hydrants with new ones that include the 5” Storz (quick connect) nozzles used by the Randolph Township Fire Department. We project to have 10 fire hydrants replaced in the Ironia section of the township in spring/summer 2022.

Consumer Confidence Report (CCR)

As a public water system, Randolph Township is obligated to issue a yearly Consumer Confidence Report related to the public water system. This report includes all required testing information and results for Randolph Township’s water system, as well as our water provider, the Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority. The 2022 CCR will be posted on the township website beginning May 16th. Visit http://www.randolphnj.org/services/water_quality_report

Engineering Projects

Calais Road – Phase 1 Road Improvements Project

Phase 1 of the road improvements to Calais Road between Dover Chester Road and Dawson Brook culvert have been awarded to a contractor and scheduled for construction in spring 2022. The scope of work includes repairs to drainage inlets and any curbs or sidewalks along the road and milling, paving and restriping. The proposed improvements will require alternating traffic on the road and possible road closures with detours during construction. Phase 2 of the Calais Road improvements is slated for 2023.

Mountainside Drive - Retaining Wall

The existing timber retaining wall within the township’s Right-of-Way (ROW) along the frontage of 19 Mountainside Drive is slated for removal and replacement. The replacement retaining wall is currently in the design phase and will be sent out to bid in summer 2022 with construction anticipated for fall 2022.

Spring Branch Collection

The township will be conducting their annual spring branch collection starting the week of Monday, April 18th. All branches need to be placed curbside by this date as it will be a **ONE TIME ONLY** pick up. No return trips will be made. This collection usually takes four weeks to complete the entire township. Brush collection will be limited to **ONE LOAD** per property owner, approximately four cubic yards (roughly 5 ft. long x 4 ft. wide x 5 ft. high). All branches should be no longer than four feet in length and three inches in diameter. This does not include LEAVES, VINES, STUMPS, and BUILDING MATERIALS, or any other non-chippable items.

Loads larger than the guidelines listed above can be removed through the special brush collection policy by contacting the Engineering office at 973-989-7066. There is a **\$150 FEE** for this additional service.

Ash Trees

The Department of Public Works (DPW) will continue the removal of dead ash trees within the township right of way due to the invasion of the Emerald Ash Borer. This project will continue every week and conclude in late October. Dead ash trees within the township right of way will be removed and stumps will be ground at no cost to the residents. The replacement of street trees will be determined by the township on a street-level basis. To date the township has removed over 400 ash trees.

Street Sweeping

The township sweeps all of the township roads once the winter season is over. This operation is performed by our DPW and takes approximately three months to complete. Please do not deposit any large debris along the edge of the road as it enters storm drains and hinders the sweeping operation.



Mulch

Delivery of fine shredded wood mulch will be available to residents from March through October. Each truckload contains approximately 6-8 cubic yards of mulch. Zoning Q&A

Q. What types of construction require a Residential Zoning Permit?

A. *Prior to the application for a building permit or the construction, erection, demolition or major alteration of any structure including, but not limited to fences, decks, pools, sheds, building additions and interior alterations, a Zoning Permit shall be secured from the Zoning Officer.*

Q. Can I store my commercial vehicles at my home?

A. *You may store one commercially registered vehicle if it is a standard size van or pickup. Anything larger must be garaged. Please call the Zoning Officer at 973-537-7128 for more details.*

Q. Can I store my RV or boat at my home?

A. *You may park such vehicles on your property as long as they are properly screened. Call the Zoning Officer for the regulations.*

Q. Can I sell my car from my home?

A. *You may sell only one car at a time and it must be located on your property.*

Q. Do I need a permit for a shed?

A. *You must get a zoning approval for any size shed. You must also get a building permit for a shed larger than 200 square feet.*

Q. Can I put my shed anywhere on my property?

A. *No, all freestanding accessory structures (i.e. pools, sheds, garages), must meet certain setbacks for your zone. Call the Zoning Officer for details.*

Q. Can garden sheds 100 square feet or less be placed closer to the property lines?

A. *Yes, each property may have one garden shed within the required setbacks up to five feet from a property line.*

Q. What hours may residents and landscapers operate lawn mowers?

A. *Lawn mowers with a muffler may be operated between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. on weekdays and 9:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. on weekends and legal holidays.*

Q. Can I use heavy machinery in my yard on the weekends?

A. *No, construction with heavy machinery is prohibited on weekends and at night. Tree clearing, earth moving, and demolition are included as well as all construction projects. The police will respond to any violations.*

Q. When do I need a lot grading permit?

A. *When land disturbance involves the construction of 1,000 square feet or more of new impervious area or 2,500 square feet or more of new soil disturbance, except for normal agricultural operations in connection with a farming operation. Contact the Engineering Department at 973-989-7066 for details.*

Q. Do I need a permit to cut down trees?

A. *Yes, contact the Planning Department at 973-989-7080 for details.*

Q. Are there any additional requirements if my property is located near a river, stream, lake or any freshwater wetland or transition area?

A. *Yes, NJDEP regulations limit the types of construction activities in these areas. It is recommended that residents review their proposed projects with the Engineering/ Planning staff in the early planning phases.*

Q. How far from my house must a pool be located?

A. *In addition to rear and side yard setbacks, pools must be at least 12 feet from the principle structure.*
