Affordable Housing Update

A Final Compliance Hearing on the Township's affordable housing plan is scheduled before the Superior Court of New Jersey on March 14, 2023. Approval of the plan will conclude over six years of litigation between the Township, interested parties, interveners and objectors.


The Township has a 643-unit cumulative Third Round (1999-2025) obligation based upon the fair share methodology calculated in a report prepared for Morris County at the direction of the Honorable Maryann L. Nergaard, JSC by Court Order of June 20, 2017. The Township's affordable housing plan before the Court for approval contains the proposed mechanisms to address this Third Round obligation. These mechanisms include new inclusionary housing projects, 100% affordable housing projects, and the rezoning of vacant or underdeveloped properties.

The Gateways and Crossings at Bennett Avenue (Habitat for Humanity) projects are currently under construction. The Village Square (Toll Brothers), Canoe Brook, Sussex Ridge and Liberty Village projects have received site plan approval from the Planning Board. No applications have been submitted for the other sites identified in the housing plan.

From the Tax Office

Did you know? There are a number of property tax deductions/rebates available to homeowners who qualify.

The following programs are administered by the **State of New Jersey**:

Property Tax Reimbursement (FREEZE)

This program is open to homeowners/mobile homeowners 65 or older, or receiving Social Security disability and meet the qualifications. The State treasury department began mailing the 2022 applications in February 2023. For more information, please visit state.nj.us/treasury/taxation/ptr/ or call 1-800-882-6597.

Affordable New Jersey Communities for Homeowners and Renters (ANCHOR)

This is a new program which replaces the Homestead Rebate.

Bulk Collection Week

Spring Bulk Collection week begins Monday, April 24 and ends on Friday, April 28. **Items must be placed curbside by 6:00 a.m.**

Monday, April 24. For this collection, Blue Diamond will be through each street only one time. Please note that this collection is simply an extension of your one-item-of-bulk-trash per weekly curbside collection service available to residents throughout the year. Items accepted include non-metal furniture, couches, mattresses, box springs, rugs/carpeting (rolled and tied in four foot lengths).

Household trash must be clearly separated from your bulk items.

Cardboard boxes cannot be used as receptacles for bulk items. Loose items must be placed in trash cans or disposable bags. Latex paint **MUST** be dried out. Paint cans can be filled with kitty litter & placed into a trash can; mixture must be solid.

ITEMS NEVER COLLECTED during the bi-annual bulk collection and/or weekly curbside trash collection include all recyclable items (metal, paper, e-waste), prohibited items (hazardous waste, building materials, and items weighing more than 200 lbs.), and vegetative waste.

Be Bear Smart

New Jersey residents, especially those in areas frequented by black bears, should take steps to avoid attracting bears with food or garbage. This is the best way to prevent black bears from becoming a nuisance near your home.

Some residents may observe black bears using yards as part of their natural travel corridors. The mere presence of a black bear is not considered a problem. Generally, bears tend to be wary of people. It is important not to leave out any food or garbage that may encourage bears to linger in residential areas. One person feeding bears can create a problem bear that may affect the entire neighborhood.

Black bears learn very quickly and those that are fed intentionally or unintentionally by carelessly leaving out food or garbage will associate people with food. Bears will eat almost anything including human food, garbage, pet food, birdseed and small livestock. Once they find an easily accessible food source, like garbage in a housing development, they will lose their wariness of people and may return to the available food source. These bears can become a nuisance or aggressive and may have to be trapped and aversively conditioned or destroyed.

If You Encounter a Bear:

1. **Remain calm and slowly back away.**
2. **Make the bear aware of you.**
3. **Be loud:** speak in an assertive voice, yell, sing, or clap your hands. If available, bang pots and pans or use an airhorn.
4. **Make yourself look big.** Wave your arms. Hold your jacket above your head.
5. **If you're in a group, stay together** and perform these actions together.
6. **Make sure the bear has an escape route.** If a bear enters your home, prop all the doors open.
7. **If the bear doesn't leave, move to a secure area.**
8. If your family lives in an area frequented by black bears, **create a "Bear Plan" for children**, with an escape route and planned use of whistles and air horns.
9. Black bear attacks are extremely rare. **If a black bear does attack, fight back!** Aim for the snout and/or eyes. Use anything at hand (knife, sticks, rocks, binoculars, backpack or kick the bear).
10. **Report black bear damage or nuisance behavior to the NJ Department of Environmental Protection's 24-hour, toll-free hotline at 1-877-WARN DEP (1-877-927-6337).**

The Randolph Township Police Department will respond to all bear sighting reports. The Police Department's response is limited to observing the bear, and notifying residents in the area that a bear has been sighted. The police will not take any other action unless the bear is aggressive and poses a threat to public safety.



Clean Communities Day and Paper Shredding Event

Clean Communities

Join local civic and scout organizations in tidying up Randolph Township at our "Clean Communities Day" on Saturday, April 29. All participants will receive gloves, garbage bags and t-shirts. Group leaders can arrange to pick up supplies in the Health Department on Thursday and Friday, April 27 & 28 between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Mini-grants are available for civic groups. Paper Shredding

As part of its Clean Communities Day, the Randolph Township Health Department will once again offer confidential paper shredding services to residents, free of charge, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 29, in the Municipal Building parking lot. Residents must have their NJ driver's license available as proof of residency. This is a drive-through event. Residents will be required to follow the traffic pattern, park where directed, and remain in their vehicles. A DPW employee will assist residents with their items.

This shredding service is:

- Randolph residents only
- Personal, confidential documents generated in the home only (not commercial or home-business generated)
- A maximum of three file boxes per household (file box = 1.5 cu feet).
- Confidential documents. This does not include junk mail and store flyers or solicitations.
- Documents that are free of any metal clips, rings or binders.

Plastic file folders, x-rays, CDs, etc. are prohibited.

Distracted Driving Enforcement

During the month of April, the Randolph Township Police Department will be increasing enforcement of motorists driving while distracted. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has designated April as Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Using your cell phone or other electronic devices while driving cannot only get you a ticket, it can get you or someone else seriously injured or killed. Distraction is deadly. According to the NHTSA, distracted drivers killed 3,142 people in 2020. If you have your phone in one hand while driving, you will have a police summons in the other. Please drive safely.

New School Crossing Guards

There has recently been a lot of activity at the Randolph School Crossing posts. In September, two of the school crossing guards retired after several years of service. Judy Shoudy, who served as a substitute crossing guard since 2019 has moved into a full-time position at one of the Shongum School posts. Before becoming a crossing guard, Judy worked for St. Clare's Emergency Medical Services for 15 years as an EMT. Judy was also a Class II Special Police Officer. She also works for COP2COP and is their team leader for critical incident debriefings.



The Township hired Zoraya Bernedo in January 2023 to work full-time at the other Shongum School post. Prior to her hiring, Zoraya did what she excels at, helping others; she was a nurse assistant, caregiver, and nanny. Zoraya is excited about her new role as a school crossing guard.



Get to Know the Randolph Rescue Squad

In 2023, the Randolph Rescue Squad (RRS) is celebrating its 56th year of providing emergency medical services to Randolph Township. Thank you to the many volunteers, supporters, partners, and leaders who have been part of our 56-year history. We are grateful for the dedication of our 2023 Board of Directors and Officers: President Christopher Zelley; Captain Caitlin Costello; Vice-President Adam Glauberg; Treasurer Michele Dempsey; Secretary Mary Luciano; Member from-the-floor Deanna Vaccaro; Member-at-large Fred Zelley; 1st Lieutenant Sheryl Madayag; 2nd Lieutenant Bryan Manfred; Sergeants Bronte Dakota, Justin Lash, Jordyn Bolan; and Jim McConnell, Delegate to the EMS Council of NJ.

We asked RRS members to address some frequently asked questions we receive:

Q: What sort of training is involved in volunteering with the Squad?

A: Members start with First Aid, CPR, and Emergency Vehicle Operator certifications. They complete an internal training program and are mentored by experienced certified volunteers. These new members become our drivers and first responders. Our NJ and National Certified Emergency Medical Technicians complete more than 200 hours of classroom work, hands-on training at a local hospital and mentorship with our experienced EMTs before passing a national certification exam.

Q: Besides responding to emergency calls, what else does the Squad do in our community?

A: The RRS is proud to be part of the Randolph Community. You will often see us standing by at community and sporting events to ensure the health and safety of participants and spectators. We sponsor blood drives; last year we hosted six blood drives with over 500 pints of blood donated. Our members provide programs for community groups like the Boy and Girl Scouts. The Squad has a Juniors program which provides high school students with the opportunity to learn and volunteer with our adult members as well as participate in leadership development opportunities.



Q: How much does the Squad charge for their services?

A: Nothing! RRS never charges for our services. Thanks to the generous donations from the members of our community and the support from Randolph Township, you will never receive a bill from us.

We are recruiting new members. No previous experience is necessary. We provide all necessary training from highly experienced professionals. Whether you are looking to become a driver/first responder, emergency medical technician (EMT), or join our auxiliary, RRS is a great way to give back to your community, learn new skills, and meet new people.

The Historical Society of Old Randolph

This vintage advertisement dated April 10, 1903 from the IRON ERA Newspaper noted the coming attraction at Baker's Opera House in Dover – a week long performance by the Howe Norris Dramatic Theatre Company. This was the next best thing to New York City theatres of Broadway for area residents. Tickets for reserved seats were purchased at Kilgore's Corner Drug Store in Dover and made a great gift for the upcoming Easter holiday. The DL&W train brought Randolph residents to 'the Baker' just two blocks away from the train depot.

The grand opening of the Baker's Opera House was on April 5, 1886. For many years the public was entertained there with minstrel shows, magic performances, vaudeville acts, as well as comic operettas. In 1906, the theatre was converted to update the premises for the silent movie era. Only music was synced to the movie by piano or organ accompaniment. Since the silent film had no synchronized sound for dialogue, on-screen inter-titles were also embedded between scenes to narrate the story. Vaudeville acts were usually scheduled prior to the movie since darkened conditions were required for movie viewing. As an added enticement nightly during their week-long engagement, the Howe Norris live theatre troupe offered one fortunate audience goer, sitting in the 20¢ or 30¢ seats, the chance to win a free bicycle. Famous personalities who performed at 'the Baker' included Helen Hayes, Lillian Russell, and Abbott & Costello. Today, the painted advertisement on the outside rear of the historic landmark building located at South Warren Street is seen from far away with the words, "Chew & Smoke Bloch Bros. West VA Mail Pouch Tobacco Clean Lasting Chew."



Project Updates

Engineering Projects

Park Avenue – Phases 1 & 2 – Road Improvements Project

Phase 1 & 2 of the road improvements to Park Avenue between Sussex Turnpike and Pleasant Hill Road have been awarded to a contractor and scheduled for construction in spring 2023. The scope of work includes repairs to any curbs or sidewalks along the road, drainage inlets, and milling, repaving, and restriping. The proposed improvements will require alternating traffic on the road, with possible closures; detours will be in place during construction.

Stormwater Management Facilities

Residents should be aware that during spring maintenance and clean-up of their properties, grass, leaves, branches and other debris should not be directed or discharged onto neighboring properties, Township properties, or stormwater management facilities such as detention basins, drainage ditches, swales, inlets or manholes. Placing debris in these facilities is likely to cause flooding and adversely impact all surrounding properties.

Water and Sewer Projects

County College of Morris Sanitary Sewer Pump Station Upgrades

The replacement of the existing County College of Morris (CCM) Pump Station located on the CCM campus has been awarded to a contractor and is slated to start construction in spring 2023, with the anticipated completion by spring 2024.

Water Department Information

Consumer Confidence Report

As a public water system, Randolph Township is obligated to issue a yearly Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) related to the public water system. This report includes all required testing information and results for Randolph Township's water system, as well as our water provider, the Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority. The 2022 CCR will be posted on the Township website beginning May 16. http://www.randolphnj.org/services/water_quality_report

Lawn Watering and Checking Sprinkler Systems for Leaks

Residents are reminded that Randolph implements lawn watering restrictions from May 1 through September 30 to conserve water and control the amount of water it draws from its bulk supplier, the Morris County Municipal Utility Authority (MCMUA). During these months, the Township enforces the odd/even lawn watering schedule for property owners served by Township water.

Spring is a good time to check your sprinkler and irrigation systems to avoid sudden spikes in your water bill. If you notice a large increase in your water usage, first check for signs of a leak in your indoor plumbing. You should turn off the water supply to your home and check to see if the needle on your water meter continues to register water use. If there are no leaks in your plumbing, then it's likely to be somewhere in your irrigation system. In that case, below are a few steps to locate the leak in your irrigation system:

- Check your irrigation controller programming to make sure it hasn't changed or returned to a default setting that increases water usage.
- Valve boxes that are wet may indicate loose wiring, water leaking due to damaged fittings, or worn parts.
- Leaks in sprinkler stations may include flooding around the sprinkler's base, water geysers from sprayheads, water spraying between sprinkler heads, water laying in the grass between sprinklers, water spurting from a sprinkler's base, or misaligned sprinkler heads.

If you notice any issues with your sprinklers or irrigation system, it is recommended that you contact your contractor for further investigation and repairs. For more information, visit the Township website or call the Engineering Department at 973-989-7066.

Changes to Mobile Food Ordinance

In response to the popularity of food trucks, it was requested that the Board of Health carefully review the existing mobile food ordinance and recommend changes, if needed. As a result, the Board convened an ad hoc committee comprised of Board members, a mobile food business operator, a "brick and mortar" food business owner and the Randolph Township Health Officer. During the course of several months, the committee carefully examined the various public health and safety issues, including but not limited to, food safety, traffic safety, land use, fees and fire safety. Afterward, the committee rendered an opinion to the Board of Health and to the Randolph Township Council.

The following changes were made to the ordinance:

- Mobile foods vendors are allowed only at "bona fide" public events, the definition of which was codified in the amended ordinance. The committee acknowledged the popularity of food trucks, but remained in favor of continuing the policy of not allowing mobile food vendors to travel about the Township at their sole discretion. Private use of mobile food trucks (i.e., on private land for a private event) continue to not be covered by the ordinance.
- Event sponsors must now register with the Health Department; there is no fee for registration. By requiring this registration for public events, the name of the responsible person can be on file, and a determination can be made as to whether the event fits the definition of "bona fide."
- A new license category, "Annual Mobile Food License" was created. The annual fee of \$275 allows licensees to attend multiple, registered "bona fide" events from January 1 to December 31.
- The former "Seasonal" food license category was renamed to "Prepackaged Frozen Dessert License," with the fee changed to \$175. This category is typically issued to traditional ice cream truck or "Good Humor-type" mobile vendors and is valid 60 days to 180 days.

Zoning Q&A

Q. What types of construction require a Residential Zoning Permit?

A. Zoning permits are required for the construction, erection, demolition or major alteration of any structure including, but not limited to, fences, decks, pools, sheds, building additions and interior alterations

Q. Can I store my commercial vehicles at my home?

A. You may store one commercially registered vehicle if it is a standard size van or pickup. Anything larger must be garaged. Please call the Zoning Officer for more details at 973-537-7128.

Q. Can I store my RV or boat at my home?

A. You may park such vehicles on your property as long as they are properly screened. Please call the Zoning Officer for the regulations.

Q. Can I sell my car from my home?

A. You may sell only one car at a time and it must be located on your property.

Q. Do I need a permit for a shed?

A. You must get a zoning approval for any size shed. You must also get a building permit for a shed larger than 200 square feet.

Q. Can I put my shed anywhere on my property?

A. No, all freestanding accessory structures (i.e. pools, sheds, garages), must meet certain setbacks for your zone. Call the Zoning Officer for details.

Q. Can garden sheds 100 square feet or less be placed closer to the property lines?

A. Yes, each property may have one garden shed within the required setbacks up to five feet from a property line.

Q. What hours may residents and landscapers operate lawn mowers?

A. Lawn mowers with a muffler may be operated between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. weekdays and 9:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. on weekends and legal holidays.

Q. Can I use heavy machinery in my yard on the weekends?

A. No, construction with heavy machinery on weekends and at night is prohibited. Tree clearing, earth moving, and demolition are included, as well as all construction projects. The police will respond to any violations.

Q. When do I need a lot grading permit?

A. When land disturbance involves the construction of 1,000 square feet or more of new impervious area or 2,500 square feet or more of new soil disturbance, except for normal agricultural operations in connection with a farming operation. Contact the Engineering Department for details at 973-989-7066.

Q. Do I need a permit to cut down trees?

A. Yes, contact the Planning Department for details at 973-989-7080.

Q. Are there any additional requirements if my property is located near a river, stream, lake or any freshwater wetland or transition area?

A. Yes, NJDEP regulations limit the types of construction activities in these areas. It is recommended that residents review their proposed projects with the Engineering/Planning staff in the early planning phases.

Q. How far from my house must a pool be located?

A. In addition to rear and side yard setbacks, pools must be at least 12 feet from the principle structure.
