Millbrook Avenue – Bridge Rehabilitation Project – Traffic Detour

From approximately June 19 through August 25, the County of Morris is scheduled to repair the Millbrook Avenue bridge structure located 150 feet northwest of the intersection with Pierson's Hill Road. This will require closure during construction and traffic detours will be posted.

The bridge, built in 1930, has an average daily traffic volume of between 4,000 – 7,000 vehicles. Due to the heavy volume, and need for repair, it was determined to close the bridge when schools are not in session.

The bridge is a stone masonry arch with retaining walls that run along both sides of Millbrook Avenue, spanning over the Mill Brook. There is deterioration of the masonry arch and walls that will require reconstruction; repair is similar to the improvements that have been made to other stone masonry arch structures in Morris County.

Traffic detour information will be provided on the Township website and social media.



Affordable Housing Update

On March 30, 2023, a Judgment of Compliance and Repose was entered by the Superior Court of New Jersey. This Judgement approves the Township's Housing Element and Fair Share Plan (HEFSP), subject to several modifications, and grants the Township immunity from all affordable housing lawsuits through July 1, 2025. This concludes a process that began with the Township filing an action in Morris County Superior Court on July 2, 2015. The HEFSP, frequently asked questions, and documents related to specific projects are available for review at: https://www.randolphnj.org/government/affordable_housing.

The HEFSP features a combination of approaches for providing the affordable housing units. This includes increased density provisions for existing zones and inclusionary zoning. Inclusionary zoning means rezoning property(s) to provide for an inclusionary set-aside (15%-20% of the total number of units in housing development) for affordable units. For example, a 15% set-aside on a 100-unit development, would yield 15 affordable units and 85 market units.

A few projects are currently under construction. These include the Gateways and Crossings at Bennett Avenue (Habitat for Humanity). Several other projects have received site plan approval from the Planning Board. These include The Village Square (Toll Brothers), Canoe Brook, Sussex Ridge and Liberty Village. No applications have been submitted for the other sites identified in the housing plan.

From the Tax Office

When are tax bills generated and mailed?

Tax bills are generated and mailed once per year in July. Once the certified tax rate is received from the County of Morris, the bills are generated and mailed to the last known owner on record.

When are tax payments due and is there a grace period?

Tax payments are due quarterly on February 1, May 1, August 1 and November 1 of each year.

There is a ten (10) day grace period for each quarter. If the payment is received after the grace period, the quarter is considered delinquent and interest is charged back to the due date. Interest is charged at 8% for the first \$1,500 and 18% for amounts over \$1,500. A penalty of 6% shall be charged on any delinquency in excess of \$10,000.00, if not paid prior to the end of the calendar year.

TAX SALE 2023

The Tax Sale for delinquent 2022 and prior years' **taxes, water & sewer, and other municipal charges** will be held on or about September 13, 2023. To prevent Tax Sale and a lien being placed on your property, please pay all your outstanding delinquent charges immediately.

When are the water and sewer bills generated, mailed and due?

Water and sewer bills are generated and mailed quarterly on February 15, April 15, May 15 and November 15 of each year.

Water and sewer payments are due quarterly on March 15, June 15, September 15 and December 15 of each year. If payment is received after the due date, the quarter is considered delinquent and interest is charged at a rate of 8% for the first \$1,500 and 18% for amounts over \$1,500. A penalty of 6% shall be charged on any delinquency in excess of \$10,000.00, if not paid prior to the end of the calendar year.

Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP)

What is LIHWAP and who is eligible?

LIHWAP is a federally funded program that provides funds to assist low-income households with water and sewer bills. To be eligible for LIHWAP benefits, the household must be responsible for their own water and sewer costs and have a gross income that falls at or below 60% of the New Jersey State Median Income level.

Only residential customer accounts are eligible. LIHWAP is NOT available for business accounts, estates, or property management companies.

"Once you arrive here, you will not want to leave"

This vintage ad from the weekly newspaper, THE JEWISH TRIBUNE AND HEBREW STANDARD THE AMERICAN JEWISH WEEKLY dated July 1, 1927 aided unsure vacationers where to go for the Fourth of July holiday. The newspaper had a wide circulation, especially on the east coast of the United States.

This full page hospitality ad not only provided information on lodging, directions, and other amenities, but also assured the Jewish community of a relaxing, welcoming environment, a stark contrast to the anti-Semitic stigma that dominated the Catskills and Adirondacks from the 1870's through the early 1930's. Most noteworthy for the Township of Randolph, the ad states, "Once you arrive here, you will not want to leave."

A COW in Randolph

The Randolph Cell on Wheels, referred to as a COW, is a portable mobile cellular tower and transceiver fully constructed on the Verizon truck. COWs are typically used for big events, emergencies, or other short term boosts of a cell network.

Randolph's COW has been in use since March, providing needed coverage and capacity to the area. Verizon plans to transition sometime in June from the COW to the Town Hall tower; the tower will provide additional capacity and coverage.



2023 Township of Randolph Budget Adopted slight tax increase to sustain programs and service levels

The Township Council unanimously adopted a 2023 budget at its April 20 Township Council Meeting, maintaining its Mission Statement to provide effective governance, enhanced customer services and excellent community facilities through careful financial management and conservative long-term fiscal planning.

The \$34.8 million 2023 budget represents a 0.34% increase, \$116,882, from the adopted 2022 budget. The 2023 budget maintains and sustains programs and services and addresses significant dollar increases in capital improvements, statutory expenditures (pensions and social security), recycling, insurance (liability, workers' compensation and health) and solid waste collection.

The 2023 budget maintains, and in some areas increases, current service levels and maintains a prudent level of fund balance in order to avoid potential spikes in future tax rates.

Significant changes in the 2023 budget include:

- Recycling and solid waste collection – the Township will realize a "negative" rebate for the disposal of the paper and plastic in 2023 and increased costs for solid waste and leaf disposal. In 2022, the Township saw the curbside collection of 2,938 tons of mixed recyclables, an increase of 18% over 2021.
- Capital improvements – funding increase is necessary to address historic rates of inflation and the need to maintain and preserve Township assets.
- Statutory expenditures – pension obligations have increased this year at a blended rate of 10.5%.
- Insurance – Cost avoidance was realized through the Township's participation in the Morris County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund (MCJIF); overall insurance costs increased.

Planned 2023 projects include capital outlay for buildings & grounds, rescue squad, fleet, parks and fire department:

- Water and Sewer – Den Brook Pump Station updates, water system pressure analysis, Birchwood Road hydrant installation, replacement of flow meters. The Township has over 82 miles of sanitary sewer lines and force mains, 10 sanitary sewer pumping stations, 145 miles of potable water lines and 1,000 fire hydrants.
- Parks, Recreation & Community Services – Freedom Park lighting replacements and field improvements, Brundage Park lighting and restroom improvements. Funding for additional youth programs, day camp and teen camp. In addition to maintaining the parks system, crews are responsible for maintaining Randolph Trails, a 16 mile course traversing five parks, and recreation programs, youth programs and classes that attracted over 29,000 registered participants in 2022.
- Public Works – Over \$1.1M in road repaving is budgeted. With approximately 152 miles of roadways, 2,200 drainage inlets, 150 storm water outfalls and 100 miles of storm drains, roadway maintenance and improvement remain a Township priority.
- Public Safety – Police Department vehicle replacements, reaccreditation through the NJ State Chiefs Association, FBI-LEEDA (Law Enforcement Executive Development Association) training and purchase of a Driving While Intoxicated instrument. Funding for maintenance and replacement of equipment for Bureau of Fire Prevention and Department of Health and Code Enforcement.

Impact to Tax Rate

The 2023 budget represents an annual increase of \$89.99, or \$7.50 per month, for the average assessed home of \$490,367.


Police Department News

The Blue Envelope Program

The "Blue Envelope" Program, introduced by the Randolph Township Police Department in conjunction with the Morris County Sheriff's Office, Morris County Prosecutor's Office, and Morris County Police Chief's Association, prevents misunderstandings with individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder during a traffic stop.

Important vehicle papers, kept in the "Blue Envelope", are presented to the officer, acting as an alert. The outside of the blue envelope contains instructions for the driver, such as keeping hands on the steering wheel and a warning about the flashing lights and noises. The reverse side of the envelope provides the officers with information to help with the interaction such as simplifying requests to the driver. Additionally, a check box on the envelope indicates whether the driver is verbal or nonverbal.

To obtain a Blue Envelope, stop by the Randolph Police Department Records Bureau window, Monday through Friday between 8:00 am-4:00 pm, or request from a police officer. No doctor's note or diagnosis is needed to obtain a Blue Envelope.



Overnight Parking in Randolph

In Randolph, local ordinance 31-91 prohibits parking any vehicles on the streets of the Township between 2:00 am and 6:00 am daily. If you need to request permission for overnight parking, contact the Randolph Police Department. Overnight parking requests may be granted if they are only for a short term temporary time frame, require a justified need and are not for an extended period of time. Examples of legitimate and justified needs include driveway resurfacing/resealing, construction projects, and/or visitors from out of town who are staying at the home.

Patrolman Richard Biase Retires

On June 1, Patrolman Richard Biase retired after serving for 26 years. His law enforcement career began as a Special Police Officer with the Montville Police Department in 1997 and included working with the Stevens Institute of Technology and the Morris County Park Police, joining the Randolph Township Police Department in 2002. Patrolman Biase, pictured at the start of his career, was a member of the Randolph Township Police Department's Support Services Unit, Crash Reconstructionist, Radar Instructor, and a Field Training Officer. During his career in Randolph, he was awarded the Life Saving award three times and the Grand Cordon award three times. He was also awarded the Honorable Service award and the Ready Commendation. Fire Department News

Important Reminders from The Randolph Township Fire Department (RTFD)

Fire Response Update:

First quarter 2023 was busy with the RTFD responding to over 130 calls for service including vehicle fires and building fires.

As the warm and dry weather approaches, it brings with it brush fire season. We have already experienced many within Morris County, several in town and one that extended to a home. This serves as a reminder that if you are using an outdoor fire pit, patio heater, or grill, remember to use them safely on non-combustible surfaces and to comply with all state and local ordinances. Do not leave the fire unattended and ensure that it is fully extinguished before leaving the area.

Don't Forget to Check your Detectors:

Beep, Beep, Beep, <Pause>, Beep, Beep, Beep, Beep, <Pause>.

This is the sound of a Temporal 4 Carbon Monoxide (CO) detector. Most residents are not aware of this special sound. If you hear this, evacuate the property immediately and call 9-1-1.

Carbon Monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas, so detection in the home is very important. While you may think it is smoke related, this temporal four sound is reporting a CO event. Should the CO levels fall below the detection level, the CO alarm may stop sounding.

Carbon Monoxide can come from a variety of appliances including gas ranges, gas clothes dryer, boilers and furnaces. Any gas powered equipment, such as a backup generator, should not be exhausted near windows or doors and should be installed by a professional following local codes. Be safe, do not operate gas powered equipment in or near your home.

Carbon Monoxide detectors should be placed on every level where there are sleeping quarters. The installation document will provide a proper mounting location.

2023 Health Screenings

The Township of Randolph offers a variety of health screenings and programs throughout the year to promote and *protect the health of Township residents*.

To pre-register for any of these clinics and screenings, please call the Health Department at 973-989-7050; pre-registration up to one month in advance.

If you have questions before or after participation at a clinic or screening, please contact the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118.

Cancer Screenings

- Men ages 18 and up. Screenings include a digital rectal exam and breast exam, prostate specific antigen blood test, urinalysis, blood pressure check, FIT test (testing for blood in the stool) and health education counseling.
- Women ages 18 and up. Screenings include a Pap test, pelvic and breast exam, FIT test (blood in stool), mammography referral (if eligible) and health education counseling.
- Male Screening: September 26, 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm
- Female Screening: October 19, 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm

Where: Morristown Medical Center Health Pavilion, 333 Mt. Hope Avenue, Rockaway, NJ

Fee: Males \$45, senior citizens \$40 Females \$55, senior citizens \$50

Pre-registration is required; contact the Health Department. Paperwork and payment must be completed to secure your spot. Call 973-989-7050.

CHEM-23

CHEM-23 is a comprehensive blood test used to provide valuable information about the general state of your health. Information obtained may be used to recommend dietary or lifestyle changes. The test also aids in detecting abnormalities that may be causing specific symptoms and can be useful in evaluating a specific health condition and monitoring the effectiveness of its treatment. Blood pressure checks are also conducted in conjunction with each session.

- Screenings are available to all Randolph residents 18 and older.
- September 29, 8:30 am – 10:30 am.
- The screening will be held at the Randolph Township Municipal Building Fee: \$35/\$25 for over 65 years of age.
- Pre-registration is required, call the Health Department 973-989-7050. In addition, new clients or those with a new physician will need to provide a signed consent form from their doctor in order to participate. Appointments are necessary.

Flu Vaccination Clinics

Randolph offers flu vaccine to all residents over 6 months of age to 65 years of age. Dates, times and locations are posted on the Township website in August as flu season approaches and our supply of vaccine arrives.

The fee is \$20 for flu or free to those with Medicare Part B ONLY. Those with any Medicare co-pay plans must self submit for reimbursement.

Advanced registration for the clinics is not required. Home visits are available for those with special needs, call the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118.

Adult Immunization Program

This program is offered through the 317-funded program for vaccines for adults, age 18 years and older.

Vaccines available are: Covid-19, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Human Papillomavirus(HPV), Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Meningococcal, Meningitis B, Pneumonia Polysaccharide, TdaP, Varicella and Zoster (Shingles, Herpes Zoster), Influenza.

Immunization Clinic dates are: July 18, August 15, September 19, October 17.

Fee for service or FREE to those uninsured or underinsured. "Underinsured" means insurance will not pay for any portion of the vaccine at all.

Appointments are required, call the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118.

Water Safety at the Lake

Be familiar with water safety steps *before* jumping in:

- Always enter any body of water feet first. Be aware of currents, waves, and underwater obstructions. Only dive into water that is marked at least nine feet deep.
- Be aware of any unexpected changes in air or water temperature. If thunder or lightning, leave the water immediately. Wait for at least 30 minutes inside after the last thunder. If you are outside, avoid tall/isolated trees, metal objects and open spaces.
- Be watchful of hazards such as dams, rocks, debris, vegetation, animals and even fish.
- Be mindful of drop-offs changing the depth of the water as well as people recreating, such as boating.
- Never swim alone or while intoxicated.
- Make sure there is a responsible adult watching children without distractions such as reading, talking on, or using a cell phone.
- Know what to do in a water emergency, call for emergency help and know CPR.

Anyone can visit the Department of Environmental Protection to learn about the health of specific lakes in NJ. Visit NJDEP-DWMS, Bureau of Freshwater and Biological Monitoring.



Be Aware of Coyotes

There has been an increase in coyote sightings in the Township; take precautions to protect yourself and your pets. Generally, coyotes are nocturnal, but may come out around sunset.

Coyotes generally avoid humans, however, the presence of pet food, compost, or trash, can lure coyotes into yards. Without the lure of food or other attractants, their visits will be brief and rare. But a coyote who finds food in one yard may learn to search for food in others.

Do not intentionally feed coyotes, it puts pets and residents at risk of radical animal behavior. Here are some general rules:

- Avoid feeding pets outside. If you must, feed them only once per day and remove the food bowl as soon as your pet has finished its meal.
- If you use compost, use enclosed bins and never compost meat or fish scraps.
- Clean up spilled bird seed around feeders.
- Remove fallen fruit from the ground.
- Keep trash in secure containers with tight-fitting lids and place the cans curbside the morning of collection (instead of the night before).
- If coyotes are present, make loud noises, blast a canned air siren, throw rocks, or spray them with a garden hose. In a pinch, standing tall, waving your arms and yelling at the coyote is the best defense. Do not run away from them. If they've become accustomed to humans, you may have to run toward them until they flee the area entirely.

Dogs, especially small dogs, are vulnerable to coyote confrontations. These incidents generally involve coyotes that are either accustomed to people (usually due to wildlife feeding), or coyotes who are protecting their territory, their mate, or their pups. Always walk dogs on a leash, and attend to them when they're outside unless you have a coyote-proof fence, which is either at least eight feet tall and made of material that coyotes cannot climb or at least six feet tall with a protective device on top.



Randolph Rescue Squad

Become a Volunteer

Looking for a few good ... volunteers


Randolph Township Rescue Squad (RRS) is a volunteer service organization, now in its 56th year of providing emergency medical services to the Township. From January through March, RRS responded to over 250 calls in addition to standbys and transportation requests.

In order to continue to serve our community, we need and welcome new members. No previous experience is necessary, training is provided. New members are guided through Basic Life Support (BLS) training sessions and our experienced EMT members recertify every few years.

Training is a vigorous and technical learning process – well worth the time and effort. It is required and monitored by the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services. Crew members must be CPR-certified to ride on an ambulance to transport a patient. Crew members who are EMT-certified deliver more complex BLS health care treatment. Several RRS members are also Advanced Life Support (ALS)-certified.

What surprises some RRS members is that their CPR, BLS, and ALS training skills often become relevant in situations that do not involve patient calls. Consider this:

Prior to the start of a recent Squad meeting, several members were chatting about their ongoing training. One junior member spoke about how her BLS skills make her feel more comfortable when she visits her grandma who lives in a nursing home. Another member explained that as he was leaving a church service with his family, one of the other church members collapsed on the walkway in front of them; he and a few others performed CPR until an ambulance arrived. Next, two more experienced members, who had just recertified, pointed out that recertification classes always include updating basic skills. This recertification class had a few changes in CPR techniques. At that point, one active long-time member, who had been listening to the conversation from the next table, jumped in to say how much he had learned using the Squad's new LUCAS (Lund University Cardiopulmonary Assist System) device which provides mechanical chest compressions to patients in cardiac arrest.



Clearly, training as RRS volunteers carries over into everyday non-RRS life. We pay attention to details, we improve our communication and life skills, we appreciate and learn about people who face difficult health challenges, we become better listeners and better leaders...JOIN US.

Engineering / Water & Sewer Project Updates

Calais Road – Phase 2 – Road Improvements Project

Design plans are being prepared for Calais Road improvements - Phase 2 - that extends between Sussex Turnpike and Dawson Brook. It is estimated that the projects will go out to bid in winter 2022-23 and scheduled for construction in fall 2024. The scope of work includes repairs to any curbs along the road, drainage inlets, and milling, repaving, and restriping.

New Jersey Natural Gas Main Installation

New Jersey Natural Gas (NJNG) has completed significant natural gas main installations and upgrades to existing natural gas lines within multiple primary roads within the Township, such as Mountainside Drive, Everdale Road, Openaki Road, Park Avenue, Righter Road, Combs Hollow Road and Pleasant Hill Road. These roads will be paved by NJNG by the end of June 2023 in accordance with the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities requirements. NJNG has also expanded natural gas mains to some secondary streets such as Sleepy Hollow Road, Main Street, Chester Avenue, Budd Street, Darlene Court, Farmstead Road East & West, South Road and Combs Avenue. Residents on these streets contemplating a new gas service connection should contact **NJNG at 800-221-0051** as soon as possible as these streets will be paved by the Township's contractors in fall 2023. Delays in property gas connections may delay Township repaving of the streets.

Meadowbrook Pump Station

Construction of the rehabilitation of the Meadowbrook Pump Station is completed.

CCM Sanitary Sewer Pump Station Upgrades

Construction has begun for the replacement of the existing Township owned County College of Morris (CCM) Pump Station located on the CCM campus. The project includes the construction of a new sanitary pump station and demolition of the existing pump station. This sanitary pump station controls sanitary sewer flows from CCM campus and Township properties along Route 10 and Jennifern Avenue. Construction is anticipated to be completed by summer 2024.

Lawn Watering

In the summer months, Randolph experiences extremely high levels of water consumption. In an effort to conserve water, the Township Council adopted new lawn watering regulations in May of 2007 for properties which receive water provided by the Township of Randolph.

Odd/Even Lawn Watering Schedule

From May 1 through September 30 of each year, the following odd/even schedule is implemented for lawn watering for properties served by Township water:

- Watering of properties having even numbered street addresses is permitted on the even numbered days of the month.
- Watering of properties having odd numbered street addresses is permitted on the odd numbered days of the month.
- No watering is permitted on the 31st day of the month.
- Watering on the above days shall be permitted during the hours from 5:00 am to 9:00 am and from 5:00 pm to 9:00 pm only.

2023 Road Resurfacing Program

As part of its ongoing road maintenance program, Randolph Township evaluates the condition of the road system on an annual basis.

This evaluation program is a collaborative effort between the Engineering and Public Works departments. The program takes into account the perspectives of both departments and synthesizes the input received into a comprehensive annual evaluation of the Township road system.

This program tracks all of the 154 center line miles of Township roadways. The 2023 funding has been adjusted to last year's, allowing for increased paving costs. Eighteen roads, the equivalent of 5.50 miles, are scheduled for resurfacing. As in past years, if funds are available after the roads scheduled for resurfacing have been completed, additional roads could be added prior to the end of the year.

The following roads are tentatively scheduled to be milled and repaved this summer.

Residents who live on these roads and plan to install new underground utility lines, such as gas or water, should schedule the installation before the road is paved.

Combs Hollow Road	South of Ursula Court to the town line
Trout Brook Lane	Entire Length
Ariel Drive	Entire Length
Beech Road	Entire Length
